"THE VILLAGE PARSON."

ASKS \$10,000 DAMAGES.

The suit of Johnson's administratrix against the Southern Railway Company for \$10,000 for the killing of Engineer Johnson, of Alexandria, in a wreck near Woodstock a year ago, was commenced there yesterday. With the first eight or ten witnesses there has been a great conflict in testimony, this being especially true of Operator Bowers at Edinburg, who claimed he delivered the "meet" order to Conductor Yochum, and Yochum conductor of one of the wrecked trains, also maintained he did not sign for the order, and claims that his signature was forged to it. The case is still in progress.

The store which was formerly conducted by Mr. J. H. Catts at the toll gate has been purchased from Mrs. Catts by Mr. Walter Hume, who is making some improvements.

NO ELEOTRIC LIGHTS.

People living at the extreme western end of King street are complaining of the failure of the electric lamps, operated by the railroad company, to burn at times. It is said that on four consecutive nights this week they were not burning. The city lights further east have also ceased to burn at times, and people entering or leaving the city at night or going to or coming from the union depot have been subjected to considerable inconvenience.

ANOTHER RECRUIT.

Robert Coleman, colored, who has been arrested three times during as many months charged with drunken and disorderly conduct, was arrested again yesterday by Officer Garvey, on a similar charge. Coleman was dismissed with an admonition, the first time he was made to face the Police Court. On the second occasion a nominal fine was imposed but this morning he was sentenced to serve thirty days in the work house.

POLICE COURT.

The following cases were disposed of this morning: Robert Coleman, colored, charged with drunken and disorderly conduct, was sent to the work house for 30 days. Samuel Williams and Mary Johnson, both colored, charged with disorderly conduct were fined \$5 each.

ADJUDGED INSANE.

Dr. Gorman and Wilkins and Justice Thompson yesterday evening held a commission on A. M. Redmond, colored, who had been taken in custody on suspicion of lunacy. The commission decided that he should be sent to an asylum. Redmond had been a laborer at the gas works for some time. He is a native of Prince William county.

MOVEMENT FOR A FERRYBOAT.

As will be seen by a notice elsewhere, the Chamber of Commerce of this city has invited all men employed at the steel plant at Gleason to meet Tuesday night at the rooms of the association, southeast corner of King and Washington streets, in order that they may participate in a conference with the transportation committee of the Chamber of Commerce, the object of which is to have a suitable boat placed on the route between Alexandria and the steel plant. The Chamber of Commerce has recently been corresponding with persons owning boats which are suitable for this route, and on Tuesday night the owner of the "Edward S. Gamble" will be present at the meeting when it is believed satisfactory arrangement will be made for placing the boat on the route. The Gamble is 60 feet long with a 15-foot beam, and can transport 100 persons with ease. The boat has a fine saloon, twin screws and is operated by gasoline.

SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHERS.

Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock at the Second Presbyterian Church there will be a meeting in the interests of the Sunday schools of Alexandria. All the teachers and officers in the various churches are expected to be present. Mr. C. W. Baines, state superintendent, will speak on the Sunday school problem in Virginia. He will deal with the Alexandria problem in a plain and helpful way. After his address the report of the committee on census will be heard and acted upon. All who are interested in the Sunday school work as well as the officers and teachers are cordially invited to attend.

A TIE-UP.

There were no trains running between Alexandria and Washington from 8 to 10:30 o'clock this morning. The trouble was occasioned by the grounding of a wire at Four-mile run. The train which left Royal street station at eight o'clock came to a standstill on the curve at Cameron and Columbus streets, where it remained until 10:35. A number of persons employed in Washington went to that city on steam trains.
