THE DEEPER WATERWAYS CONVENTION.

Norfolk will be the center of national interest this week. In the city will be held the second annual convention of the Atlantic Deep Waterways Association, which was organized in Philadelphia two years ago and which held its first annual convention in Baltimore last year. Congressman J. Hampton Moore, of Philadelphia, is its president.

At the Norfolk convention, which will begin tomorrow and end on Saturday, the great project of safe and economical transportation through deepened rivers and canals and through bays and sounds which need no dredging, will be urged by constructive statesmen and progressive business men of the several states of the Atlantic seaboard from Maine to Florida. Army and navy experts will urge the deeper waterways as impregnable means of defense of inland cities, in time of war.

President Taft, by his speech on "The Need of Waterways," will give an impetus to the movement which will do much to carry it to completion, for the work has already begun, while Congress has authorized a survey of the entire route and has made a liberal appropriation for the project. President Taft has already declared himself to be in favor of a bond issue by the government with which to improve inland waterways.

The convention will begin at noon tomorrow in the Monticello Hotel. Some of the noted men who, in addition to President Taft, will urge the important national enterprise are:

Congressman J. Hampton Moore, of Philadelphia; Governor Swanson, of Virginia; Mayor Riddick, of Norfolk; Congressman Cocks, of New York; Congressman Small and Thomas, of North Carolina; Congressman Ransdell, of Louisiana, president of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress; Hon. John Barrett, director of the International Bureau of American Republics; Mr. Lewis Nixon, the shipbuilder, of New York.

There will be short discussions on various subjects relating to deep waterways by many public men including Vice President Sherman, Secretaries Dickinson, Meyer and Nagel; Congressmen Lumb, Carlin, Maynard and Saunders, of Virginia, and others.

Norfolk will decorate and illuminate while the convention is in session. The city's hospitality will be lavish and will be at its best on Friday, "the President's Day," when President Taft will be the city's guest.

The president will be escorted to the Monticello Hotel, where the convention will be held. After an informal reception he will be escorted to the reviewing stand, at the corner of Commerce Place and Main street, where after reviewing the parade of which Colonel Waller will be grand marshal the president will deliver an address. From the reviewing stand he will be conveyed to Cape Henry to enjoy an oyster roast. Returning to the city, he will go to the home of Mr. Fergus Reid, where he will spend the night. He will attend the "smoker" to the visiting press in Armory Hall on the night of the 19th. He will go to Hampton Saturday morning.

The "smoker" will be essentially a southern affair. It will include vade-villie specialties and a genuine cakewalk.

The Marine Band will be sent to Norfolk on the occasion of the president's visit. The band will head the big military and naval parade, and also play at the press smoker.

Saturday, the final day of the convention, will be devoted to an inspection of the Norfolk harbor and its approaches, the navy yard and war vessels. Leaving Newport News at 2:30 p. m. the visitors will arrive at Old Point at 3 o'clock where a drill will be given.

HER "HUSBAND" A WOMAN.

Divorce on the singular grounds of fraud in the marriage contract was awarded Saturday, in San Francisco, to Dr. Alice Bash, of Oakland. The fraud lay in the fact that R. K. Morgan, Dr. Bash's "husband," who came from New York city, proved to be a woman. Morgan was not more than half Dr. Bash's age, but the two had been constant companions. They were married in 1905. The complaint does not state when the wife discovered her "husband's" sex, though it declares she "was, is now, and always has been female." Morgan has disappeared, and Dr. Bash refuses to discuss her adventure in matrimony.

THIEF CAUGHT.

The mysterious riding of trunks containing jewelry along the line of the Southern Railway, which has resulted in thousands of dollars of loss and has been causing the railroad authorities much worry and trouble has been cleared by the arrest and confession of George L. Brown, a baggage master running between Washington and Charlotte, N. C. A young Washington woman, to whom Brown had given jewelry, returned to the police these gifts. Brown admitted he was the man who had recently sold 25 diamonds to a pawn-broker in Washington receiving \$913 for them. Later the pawn-broker identified him.
