MR. FAIRBANKS IN ROME.

The visit to Rome of Orestes W. Fairbanks, former vice president of the United States, brought about a very delicate situation, owing to the fact that he wished to pay his respects to the king, the pope and the American Methodist Church.

By a tactful arrangement Mr. Fairbanks' audience with King Victor Emmanuel was fixed for Saturday and that with the pope for Monday, and when every thing seemed satisfactorily planned the Vatican suddenly announced that it would be impossible for the pontiff to receive the former vice president if he carried out his announced intention to speak in the American Methodist Church there, because the Methodists had been active in proselyting among the Catholics.

Negotiations were immediately begun with a view to avoiding any unpleasantness and a situation which might give rise to misconceptions, and in these negotiations prominent Vatican officials exercised every influence to remove the difficulties which had so unexpectedly presented themselves to Mr. Fairbanks' audience with the pope.

But Mr. Fairbanks finally declared that although he was animated by a strong desire to pay his respects to the pope of the Catholic Church, whose followers had played such an important part in good American citizenship, he could not withdraw from his promise to deliver an address before the American Methodist Church.

Monsignor Kennedy, rector of the American College, gave a dinner at noon in honor of Mr. Fairbanks at which the latter and the monsignor made responses to the toast.

VOICES TO INVITE BAILEY.

The San Carolina Senate agreed yesterday to let Senator Bailey address it, but it refused to agree to amendments extending similar invitations to Governor Hughes, of New York, and Senator Daniel, of Virginia.

After a debate of two hours, which was marked by bitter and repeated references to Senator Bailey's connection with Standard Oil, the Senate concurred in the House resolution asking the Texas senator to address the general assembly in income tax amendment to the Federal constitution.

The leader in the opposition to Senator Bailey being invited has been State Senator Siskler, whose cousin, Senator Manning, had a personal altercation with the Texas senator in the lobby of the Capitol at Washington.

When the Senate agreed to adopt the resolution by a vote of 20 to 14, Senator Siskler tried to have Governor Hughes, of New York, and Senator Daniel, of Virginia, included in the invitation, but both amendments were voted down.

LAI'D DOWN THEIR ARMS.

After defying the law for a long time and terrorizing the communities in which they lived, Jim Daniels and his five sons, noted Kentucky-West Virginia feudists, have thrown away their pistols, knives and rifles and put on sackcloth and ashes and vow henceforth they will walk the narrow and straight path of righteousness.

Friday evening old man Daniels and his boys marched into the little town of Pikeville, Ky., laid down their notched firearms and surrendered to the sheriff of Pike county, who immediately locked the man-killers in jail. Old man Daniels said he was tired of chasing justice and shooting enemies and that having recently been converted by an evangelist, he was ready, with his sons, to take whatever medicine justice prescribes.

In attempting to capture the family several months ago a posse opened fire on the Daniels' home near Devons, W. Va., and killed Mrs. Daniels and her daughter. During the fight a son, wanted for killing Heron Christian, another feudist, made his escape in the darkness. This son was among the number that surrendered last night.

She drank laudanum. Death came at the hospital following the finding of her unconscious body in her apartment.

My wife was rushed to the hospital in time to save her life.

At one time she occupied apartments in the fashionable Jefferson flats Friday night she drank the second draught at her Vasco apartments, retired a few days ago.

Mrs. Andrews dined at a hotel. On her arrival at her apartments, about 7 o'clock, she called up her friend over the telephone. She refused to go to her. She declared she would kill herself if he didn't respond immediately. She sent a messenger. A second retreat followed. Going into her room, she dialed the contents of a small phial. When found, a short time afterward, she was unconscious, and died within an hour at the City Hospital. Application for a divorce from her husband, Roy Andrews, of the Richmond Hotel, was scheduled for trial yesterday. She had charged abandonment and neglect. No defense, as far as is known, had been made. She had been separated from him about six months.

BAPTIZED IN ICE RIVER.

Though the thermometer registered 7° above zero in Shamokin, Pa., yesterday afternoon, Rev. George Yost, pastor of the Menonite Church, broke the ice, which was eight inches thick, and waded into Elgwood Park Lake four times, in each instance with a person whom he baptized. A man, woman, girl and boy took the icy dip. An enthusiastic number of the Menonites surrounded Rev. Mr. Yost and the people who ventured into the water. The pastor prayed and the congregation sang, after which the baptisms took place, each subject wading into the lake up to his chest, waded upon Rev. Mr. Yost thrust the head of each convert under the water. Those baptized then walked to a nearby house, put on dry clothing and returned to Shamokin.

A dispatch from Phoenix, Ariz., says:

Hedless of the warning of a foreman in charge of excavating operations along the line of the private motor road from Kelvin to the R. Y. copper mines, the motor-man of a gasoline car containing six passengers ran his car close to a sputtering charge of dynamite yesterday, and the car and its seven occupants were blown to atoms.

BOY SHOT HIS FATHER.

Believing his sister was being checked to death, George D. Roderick, aged 17 years, yesterday shot and probably fatally wounded his father in Philadelphia while his mother stood by horror-stricken. William Roderick, aged 57 years, the father, had quarreled with his daughter, aged 24 years, because she refused to tell him whether or not she intended to marry a young man who had been calling on her. He had grasped her by the throat when the boy, believing his sister's life was in danger, ran up stairs, secured a revolver, and returning, shot his father twice. One bullet penetrated the back of the skull and the other lodged in the elder Roderick's shoulder. Carrying the smoking weapon in his hand, young Roderick dashed from the house and ran two squares to a friend's house after which he surrendered himself to the police.


