THE MASONIC CELEBRATION.

With the attendance of the secretary the war, the grand masters of many of the Grand Lodges in this country, the heads of various branches of Masonry and many other distinguished personages, prominently identified with the craft, Alexandria-Washington Lodge, No. 22, A., F. & M., has arranged for February 22nd one of the most elaborate Masonic celebrations ever held in America.

The special and important object of the gathering of Masonic dignitaries is to organize a National Masonic Memorial Association, for the purpose of erecting a memorial to "Washington, the Mason," at Alexandria.

Washington's association with the Masons of Alexandria and the fact that the lodge bearing his name possesses so many relics of the great American and his Masonic contemporaries, makes this city the most interesting in the country the craft in the United States and the city which Washington always called his own and in which he took so much interest in by all means the place for the proposed memorial. The programme for the celebration has heretofore been published.

The proposed site for the memorial is on Washington street, in the vicinity of old Christ Church, of which he was a vestryman. This thoroughfare, surveyed and named for him, extending from north to south, pointing directly to the federal city on the north and to Mount Vernon, an equal distance on both sides, will be a peculiarly fitting location for this hall of fame.

ATTEMPTED SUICIDE. Albert Sason, of northwest Washington, went to the window last night for lodging. During the night Officer Roberts in making an inspection discovered that Sason had tied a handkerchief around his neck and had nearly succeeded in strangling himself to death. He called to Lieutenant Smith and Sason was quickly pulled out of the window which he had tied and the handkerchief taken from his neck. Sason then was taken to the hospital where officers were kept at work on him for three and a half hours. Sason left this morning for his home.

TRAIN DISPATCHING BY TELEPHONE. The Georgia Railroad will install within the next few weeks telephone equipment for dispatching trains between Augusta and Atlanta, Georgia, a distance of 171 miles, and from Ocala, Georgia, to Macon, Georgia, a distance of 74 miles. There will be twenty-eight regular stations and five siding telephones on the line from Augusta to Atlanta, and twenty regular stations from Ocala to Macon. The Georgia installation is the first one in that section of the country.

BODY OF BABY FOUND. It is reported that the body of a newly born infant was found alongside the north bound track of the Southern Railway some miles south of Alexandria on Thursday morning. The little one had died from exposure. It is not known whether the child was thrown from a train or placed where found by some person living nearby.

MURDERERS IN JAIL. Securely shackled together with a pair of handcuffs and closely guarded by detectives, charged with the murder of Jane Adams, William Saylor and his brother, Arvis Saylor, captured in Petersburg, Va., on Wednesday night, arrived at Atlantic City at 8:45 o'clock last night, and were quickly hustled to the city jail through a throng of nearly a thousand persons.

INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION. President Tait and a group of other, distinguished speakers addressing a select gathering last evening at the home of Miss Mabel B. Gardner, in Washington, were unanimous in the opinion that industrial education is a crying need of the south irrespective of race or class.

REARRIED IN 12 MINUTES. Divorced and married again in 12 minutes was the record established yesterday by Otto Unger, an acrobat at the Hippodrome. At 3 o'clock yesterday Supreme Court Justice McCall, of New York, granted Unger an absolute decree of divorce from his wife, Corneilia Unger. Sitting with him in court at the time the decree was granted was Melville Ansh Brough, an opera singer, 28 years old, of 1506 Second avenue.

REARRIED IN 12 MINUTES. Justice McCall's signature had hardly dried on the divorce papers when Unger, accompanied by Miss Brough and his counsel, William Klein, left the court house for the City Hall. At 3:05 p. m. Unger had received a marriage license from City Clerk Scully. A telephone message to Alderman John J. White brought the Alderman to the City Hall at 3:09 p. m.
