SOUTHERN TRAIN WRECKED.

East mail and passenger train No. 36, of the Southern Railway, running from New Orleans to Washington, was wrecked near Franklin Junction, about 35 miles north of Danville, about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, injuring about 16 persons.

The Sinking of the French Submarine.

Paris, May 31.—An attempt to cover up the alleged negligence of the crew of the submarine Pluiole, which was sunk off Ocala in a collision with a channel plocket and her crew of 27 drowned, is hinted at by the Paris press today, as a result of the admiralty's decision to open the submarine at Oberburg, instead of Ocala, when she is finally raised.

Work of examining the submarine will be conducted by the experts of the naval station there and a "case made up" in favor of Commander Oallot and his sea-men.

The Inheritance Tax. Washington, D. C. 31.—A decision which affects something over \$2,600,000 was rendered by the U. S. Supreme Court today in a sort of legal epilogue to the old inheritance tax. The court held that when a testator died within one year immediately preceding taking effect of the repealing act, his legacy was not relieved from taxation under the original inheritance law of June 13, 1898.

The question came in the form of a certiorari from the Circuit Court of Appeals for the 7th circuit. One of the highest courts was confronted with the problem, but was equally divided as to the answer.

The lower courts have rendered various opinions the Circuit Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit holding that the tax should be paid, and the Courts of Appeal in the Second, First, Third and Seventh held to the contrary.

The government claims that under the differing opinions the rule of taxation is different in various parts of the country and that, apart from the injustice and impropriety of this condition, there are claims pending against the government amounting to \$3,600,000 involved in settlement of the question.

The opinion of the court was read by Justice Brandeis.

Shreds Raiment to Save Brother. Chester, Pa., May 31.—Stripping his clothes into shreds, knoting the strips into a rope and tying the ends to a pole, 6-year-old Roger Corson, of Upland, saved his 9-year-old brother, Clyde, from drowning in Chester river yesterday afternoon. Clyde was playing along the wharf of the S. A. Orzoff & Son Manufacturing Company, when he missed his footing and fell overboard. His cries were heard only by Roger, who, peering over the edge of the stone embankment, shouted encouragement to Clyde, who was holding on by the slippery stone projections. Roger, diving, tore his gingham blouse into strips to make them reach to the drowning boy, after he had used his trousers to piece out the life-chain, and the rope was made fast to a pole. This kept the boy afloat until the shoats of Roger brought aid.

Last night a movement was started to either provide a medal for the boy or to do something substantial in recognition of his pluck and bravery.

Admitting a shortage of \$2,000 in his accounts, which he says, he cannot explain, Postmaster George L. Clark of Morristown, N. J., has been relieved of duty by the postal inspectors, who have been examining his books for a week. The shortage has been made up by Mr. Clarke's bondsmen.

The head of Joseph Barraud was today introduced as an exhibit in the trial of Louis Lavillagere, in Limoges, France, in an effort to show that Barraud died from a fractured skull, resulting from a blow from Lavillagere.
