NEWS OF THE DAY.

The daughter of Archdeacon Emery, of California, has gone back to her Japanese husband, whom she sued for divorce.

With the railroad bill on the eve of passage, it was announced by the interstate commerce commission yesterday that there would be no delay in settling the question of whether the increased rates by the railroads are just and reasonable.

Mystery surrounding the abandonment of a baby on a bench in Iowa circle, Washington, about a week ago was solved last night by the arrest of Alice Collins, 20 years old, who, the police say, has been behind cell bars before, and who is known to the police as "a servant girl thief."

The worst cloudburst in many years caused hundreds of thousands of dollars damage in Berlin last night. Cellars everywhere were flooded and street cars, omnibuses and other traffic stopped. The subway was filled with water. The tables and chairs of outdoor restaurants were swept away.

Without a word of farewell, and apparently without a cause, John W. Kuhns, 22 years old, manager of the Eastern Cycle Company, disappeared from his home in Washington, last Sunday afternoon, and has been absent since. Kuhns is known to have had nearly \$200 in his pocket when he left home, and the fact that he was well supplied with funds is said to have been known by a band of thugs in the southeast.

Guilty on two counts out of eighteen was the verdict returned last night in Criminal Court No. 2 in the case of J. Barton Miller, secretary and treasurer of the First Cooperative Building Association of Georgetown, charged with the embezzlement of the funds of the association, which the government contended aggregated \$134,000.

He was apparently an Englishman, about 25 years of age.

Leon Gulpan, an illustrator and decorator, shot himself yesterday in his studio at 369 West Twenty-second street, New York. Before killing himself he straightened up all his affairs, sending a check for his savings, \$7,211, to his fiancée, Miss Agnes Foster, of Boston, writing to his friend, Hiram C. Merrill, of New York, and sending back to publishing companies two manuscripts which he was illustrating. In his letter to Mr. Merrill he said he took the step because the doctors had told him that he was doomed. He did not want to poison the life of the girl to whom he was engaged, he said, but he could not live without her.
