### DR. HYDE SENTENCED.

Dr. B. C. Hyde, convicted of having poisoned Col. Thomas H. Swope, the millionaire philanthropist, was sentenced to life imprisonment at hard labor by Judge Ralph S. Latschaw, in the Criminal Court in Kansas City, Mo., yesterday morning.

An appeal to the State Supreme Court was filed by Hyde's attorney, and until it is taken up by the higher court the prisoner will remain in jail.

The case was called by Judge Latschaw as soon as court was opened yesterday morning. The doctor and his wife, who had stood by him so faithfully, sat side by side and held each other's hands. Judge Latschaw pronounced judgment and commanded Dr. Hyde to stand up. Before passing sentence he asked the prisoner if he had anything to say.

Dr. Hyde, smiling and calm, replied: "I did not understand you judge."

"Have you anything to say why sentence should not be passed upon you?" repeated the judge.

"My attorneys will talk for me," said Dr. Hyde quietly.

At this point Attorney Lucas, for the defense, arose and told the court he had nothing to say. Then Dr. Hyde remained standing. Judge Latschaw continued:

"The judgment of the court, Dr. Hyde is that you be confined in the state penitentiary at Jefferson City at hard labor for and during the period of your natural life.

A moment later Dr. Hyde had resumed his seat by his wife at the attorneys' table.

His attorneys asked the court to grant bail. This Judge Latschaw said he could not do, and then Mr. Lucas presented an affidavit for an appeal to the State Supreme Court. This was accepted by Judge Latschaw and Hyde was remanded to the county jail.

The court said the prisoner would be kept there until the Supreme Court has passed finally on his case. As the court does not meet until the first week in September, and as it has a heavy docket, it is the belief of the attorneys that the case cannot be reached for at least six months.

**JEFFRIES' PARENTS.**  
"It's the Lord's will; let us not be downcast. Jim has fought his last fight," said Rev. Alexis C. Jeffries, father of Jim Jeffries, in Los Angeles, Cal., on Monday, when he was told that his son was whipped. His tone was reverent.

This will break his heart. The Lord has helped Jim a great deal in his life. He is prosperous and has had honors, but I am afraid he has not lived as he ought to—late hours, you know, and smoking; and I have thought that Jim drank a little at times. That shows that he has not lived right, and the Lord has taken this way of bringing him to his senses. I hope it will be a lesson to Jim."

During the early rounds of the fight the old evangelist did not show any perturbation. He and Mrs. Jeffries talked as the old lady knitted, Mrs. Jeffries saying nothing to the reporters, but was evidently very nervous. The old man, however, was confident the son, of whom he is still proud, would be victor.

"That's the way with Jim," he said once. "He always takes a great deal of punishment, but that's nothing to him." The old man was excited, but tried to carry it off with dignity.

"When Jim was a boy"—and he rambled off into reminiscences, always making a point that Jim was "stout" and came from a line of stout men, and was good to his father and mother.

"Johnson wins in the fifteenth round!" shouted a reporter, rushing back from a telephone.

**KILLED IN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT.**  
The automobile of Dr. Benjamin N. Stahl, a Philadelphia physician, ran wild down a steep hill in Hillsdale, N. Y., yesterday afternoon, and Mrs. Stahl was almost instantly killed.

Dr. Stahl and his nephew, J. Watson Dalmar, of Washington, were thrown out. The former was seriously injured, while Mr. Dalmar escaped with a few bruises.

The party was on its way to Banglee Lakes, Me., where they intended to spend the summer. The trip by automobile was uneventful until the summit of the hill was reached, and Dr. Stahl, who was driving the touring car, changed his gear to coast down the incline.

As the machine gathered speed suddenly, Dr. Stahl applied the brake, but it failed to work, and, with added momentum, the car shot down the steep hill at a great rate. It had hardly covered half the distance, when, in spite of Dr. Stahl's desperate efforts to steer a good course, the wheels struck a stone and the car turned a somersault, throwing all the occupants out.

Mrs. Stahl struck upon her head and was dead when Mr. Dalmar recovered sufficiently to proceed to her assistance. Dr. Stahl was nearly unconscious when assistance arrived.

**FRENCH OBERAMMERGAU.**  
The French Oberammergau, the first steps toward which were taken several years ago, is no longer a dream, according to a letter from Domremy, published in a Berlin paper.

The building, to be known as the Nature Theatre, will soon be erected in the Bois Chenn, where, it is said, the calf came to Jeanne d'Arc. The first performance is to take place on May 7, 1911, when the play founded on the life and career of the Maid of Orleans will be produced. The principal parts will be taken by French actors of high standing, but the minor parts will be allotted to natives of Domremy. The play will require a company of more than six hundred persons, nearly two hundred of whom will appear mounted on horses. The plan includes two performances each in the months of June, July and August.

Emperor William has at last abandoned his opposition to horse racing and has become a patron of the turf. It has developed that just before the kaiser sailed on his summer cruise Monday he consented to act as patron of the Union Club in Berlin, the principal turf club in Germany.

The appointment of Dr. James Brown Scott, solicitor of the State Department, to act in the capacity of a special counsel to the department in connection with Secretary Knox's proposal for the establishment of a court of arbitral justice at The Hague has been announced.


