INCREASE IN PUBLIC EXPENSES

Former Governor David B. Hill returned to his old home in Elmira, N. Y., Wednesday to spend a week with friends for the first time in four years. He spoke at the Chemung county fair grounds in the afternoon to a large audience. After relating many reminiscences of his career, which began in Elmira, he dwelt at some length on the dangers that confront the country, and replied to the suggestions made by Governor Hughes in his Syracuse speech. He said:
"One of the dangers that confront the country today in the already increased and still increasing expenditures of government in nation and state. Good old-fashioned economy seems to have been abandoned and wild schemes of every character are being substituted in its stead. The extent to which official salaries have been increased in both state and nation is appalling, and the end is not yet. The country cannot long stand such reckless legislation, and in my opinion it is high time to call a halt."
He then criticised severely methods of "indirect taxation," saying it makes no difference in the result, so long as the money comes out of pockets. Indirect taxation might for a time deceive and mislead the people, but eventually the true situation would become apparent.
He pointed out that the expense of the state government for the fiscal year was \$34,494,429.93, while under his administration the heaviest expenses were a little over \$14,000,000.

LEAPED FROM A TRAIN.

By leaping from a train of the Pennsylvania Railroad in the Hoffman street (Baltimore) tunnel last night Marcus Golden, of Baltimore, escaped from a Washington detective who was bringing him to the capital from New York, where he was arrested on Wednesday on the charge of the larceny of two watches, valued at \$50. Whether Golden is dead or alive the Baltimore police are unable to say. Golden has been convicted in Washington on the charge of the larceny of the watches from M. V. Korzman, a jeweler of that city, where he was employed as a salesman. At a late hour last night nothing had been heard from Golden.

REVOKED POWER OF ATTORNEY

Robert Winthrop Chanler has revoked the power of attorney he gave to Lina Cavalieri to collect the income from his estate under their famous anti-nuptial agreement. This statement was made in New York yesterday by Sidney Harris, Chanler's attorney, who said that notice of the revocation had been served on trustees of the estate. No other action is needed. Mr. Harris declared, to give effect to the revocation, and it will not be filed in any office of record.
This move is intended to make it impossible for Cavalieri to obtain the income from the three trust funds set aside for Chanler.
Within two or three days Mr. Harris intends to answer the summons and complaint filed by attorneys for Mrs. Julia Chamberlain Chanler, the artist's first wife, which questions the legality of his agreement with his bride. Mr. Harris would not indicate, however, what will be the nature of his reply.
