SYNOD OF VIRGINIA.

At the meeting of the Synod of Virginia at Charlottesville yesterday the committee appointed to present a paper in reference to the fortieth anniversary of Dr. James P. Smith's service as stated clerk, reported that during all these years Dr. Smith had never failed to attend the meetings of the synod. Dr. Russell Cecil, the moderator, then presented Dr. Smith a fountain pen as a slight token of great affection and high regard.

Dr. S. S. Law, of Washington, D. C., offered the following:

"Whereas, the Presbyterian Orphanage, at Lynchburg, is a purely secular affair, though a benevolent and philanthropic enterprise and worthy of support and patronage; and

"Whereas, it is not the proper business of the Synod of Virginia to engage in the management and financial support of such enterprise; therefore be it

"Resolved, that this Synod of Virginia does now and henceforth abandon all engagement and financial responsibility in support of same."

The committee to nominate trustees of Hampden-Sidney College submitted the names of ministers for those positions.

The committee to nominate the directors of the Presbyterian Orphan's Home at Lynchburg, also submitted their report. Rev. J. R. Sevier, of Alexandria, is among the names recommended.

A memorial service was held at 11 o'clock, presided over by Rev. J. Calvin Stewart, of Richmond. There were 11 deaths in the synod during the past year, as against 2 the year before. A memorial of each was read by committees appointed by the moderator.

PHILADELPHIA VICTORIOUS.

In a clean and sharply played game the Philadelphia American League baseball champions defeated the Chicago Cubs, the premier team of the National League, at Shibe Park, Philadelphia, yesterday afternoon by the score of 4 to 1 in the first contest of the series to decide the world championship.

The crowd that saw the game was not the largest that ever attended a baseball game in Philadelphia. The official count of the attendance was 26,891, and the total receipts \$37,424.50. Of this amount the players will receive \$20,209.23 the club owners \$13,472.82, and the National Commission \$3,742.45.

The failure of a record crowd to attend was due partly to the inability of thousands to obtain reserved seat tickets, and to the fact that the Police Department would not permit anyone to stand in the aisles of the grand stand. The National Commission had arranged to sell several thousand standing room tickets in the big pavilion, but after 88 of them had been disposed of the police shut down on the sale.

The bleacher seats were packed, and there were several thousand persons crowded behind the ropes in right and left fields.

The bleachers were filled two hours before the games began, several thousand of the rooters having spent most of the night at the gates of Shibe Park in order to get good seats.

Outside the grounds enterprising householders whose homes overlooked the playing field erected bleacher seats on the roofs, and sold them at from \$3 to \$5 each.

William Coles, of Campbell county, who sold wine made of tomatoes was fined \$100 and held in \$500 bail.

STRIKE ENDED.

The railroad strike in Paris was formally called off last night. This was decided at a meeting of the strike committee of the National Railroaders' Union.

Work will be resumed on all lines today.

The succession of bomb outrages in connection with the railroad strike reached a climax yesterday in an attempt to wreck a passenger train at Versailles.

A bomb was thrown at the entrance of the tunnel to the Chantiers station at the moment a Paris train was due from Dreux. The bomb struck the limb of a tree and bounding off, landed beside the tracks with a terrific explosion. It tore a great hole, sending up showers of earth and fragments of the iron of which it was constructed.

So great was the force of the explosion that all Versailles was shaken.

The police attribute the bomb-throwing to anarchists and fighting revolutionists. They do not believe that the rank and file among the strikers are responsible.

Attempts at train wrecking are reported from various parts of France, and serious catastrophes have been narrowly averted.

The express from Marseilles for Nice was derailed, and the working parts of several trains were found to have been tampered with.

Six hundred women, the wives of strikers, attempted to parade last night. They carried placards, summoning the women of France to oppose "the scandalous opulence of the financiers," and help to alleviate the misery of the small wage earners. The police dispersed the women and arrested several of them.

Wireless stations along the coast were in communication with a number of steamers, but none of them have any news, although they had been sending out messages with the hope of reaching the airship.
