ROOSEVELT'S NEMESIS.

True to her word, Mrs. Ida Von Claussen, strode into the Tombs Police Court in New York yesterday to get a warrant for Theodore Roosevelt. She was attired in a natty suit of blue serge, off set with a large picture hat and carrying in her arms a bundle of legal documents. She narrowly escaped being committed for an examination as to her sanity.

Mrs. Von Claussen attempted to have a warrant issued for Roosevelt's arrest Monday and, after delivering a lengthy argument during which she accused the former president of "embezzling" \$5,000,000 from the United States, she was refused.

Magistrate Herbert told his caller she needed look after, and advised her to go home and "behave herself." She retorted that all courts were corrupt and that there was no justice in store for her anywhere.

The magistrate spoke to Mrs. Von Claussen's father for several minutes and then asked him to swear out a warrant for his daughter's arrest on a charge of insanity. The father refused, but promised to keep a watchful eye on his daughter.

Then gathering up her legal documents and flashing an angry look at the magistrate, Mrs. Von Claussen bowed low, turned and walked out of the room, with her father a few feet behind.

STRIKE AVERTED.

A threatened strike of the union motormen and conductors of the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company was averted late yesterday afternoon, when arbitrators who had been trying to adjust an issue raised by the last strike early in the present year came to a compromise agreement.

The arbitrators Raymond, Robins, of Chicago, representing the men, and John G. Vogler, of Philadelphia, the company's representative, eliminates professional strikebreakers, employed during the last strike, and who are still with the company, as loyal employees, but they ruled that the men who did not go out on a strike and those employed at the regular rate of wages at 22 cents an hour during the trouble shall receive preference runs over the men who quit work. No provision is made by the arbitrators for the men hired during the strike at bonus wages.

The award of the arbitrators will be accepted by the company.

ATTACKED BY A CHIMPANZEE.

As twenty work girls came out of a dressmaker's shop in the Rue Boileau, Paris, at midday recently, an arm encircled the waist of one of them. The girl protested indignantly. The tool-tail intruder was well dressed in a frock coat, grey trousers, top hat, patent leather boots and wore smart grey suede gloves. But he was a hideous-looking person.

The girl began making fun of him, when suddenly he caught hold of one of them and put his face close against hers. She boomed his ears and he dropped on all fours and bit her.

There was a panic. The girls rushed off shrieking and two policemen arrested the aggressor. The creature was a chimpanzee, the pet of an explorer living near at hand. He was captured after a struggle and carried off by his master's cook, who went to fetch him at the police station where he spent the night.

An amusing item of the story is that the police magistrate got very angry with the monkey when he was first brought in because he refused to answer any question and turned his back on the official table.

SUICIDE AT ATLANTIC CITY.

Mrs. Emily Dessi, a visitor from France, committed suicide yesterday in the ocean at Atlantic City. She left her hotel on the beach front at the foot of South Carolina avenue, went to the beach, removed part of her clothing, which she piled neatly on the sand, and then walked out beyond her depth to death. There was a renewal yesterday of the rioting in the South Wales, England, coalfields, where 30,000 miners are on strike because of the employment of nonunion men.
