## SUFFRAGETTES ASSAULT ASQUITH.

Premier Asquith was assaulted by suffragettes in the precincts of the British House of Commons yesterday, and was saved from rough handling only by the prompt arrival of a strong body of police.

At a meeting at Caxton Hall Miss Christobel Pankhurst characterized the minister's statement as wholly unsatisfactory and "nothing more nor less than an insult to the cause." The women, she shouted, considered the premier's attitude a declaration of war and they would answer the challenge immediately.

No sooner said than done. With a rush the women emptied the hall and several hundred strong started for Downing street. They encountered Mr. Asquith en route, and before the premier realized the situation he was surrounded by irate suffragettes. It was not long before he recognized that he was in a hostile camp for without any preliminaries Miss Henrietta Williams struck the government leader, at the same time ejaculating: "You tax women as heavily as moon, yet women are not represented in Parliament."

Shrill police whistles brought officers from all nearby quarters and the women struggled among themselves for the privilege of getting at him, the premier was hustled into a taxicab.

As the car started off with a bound Miss Williams made another attempt to reach its occupant and in doing so put her fist through the glass of the car window. She was pulled away still crying "traitor" and "coward."

The trouble did not end with the escape of Mr. Asquith. Robbed of their special prey a big body of women broke through the police barrier and reached Downing street. For a time pandemonium reigned in the vicinity of the ministerial residences and government offices.

Shrieking women, many of them armed with bamboo poles that had been used to support banners, but now served as lances, fought like amazons, desperately attacking the police and clawing and kicking to such good purpose that the police line was broken and the officers forced to temporarily retire.

Police reinforcements were hurried to the scene and, throwing themselves against the rioters, checked the advance. Women and their male sympathizers were hurled to the ground. In many instances the officers literally dragged the women out of the fighting zone and thus saved them from being trampled to death by the mob behind. It was sometime before the police succeeded in clearing Downing street. A litter of millinery, bits of clothing, handbags and torn banners gave evidence of the fierceness with which the field had been contested. During the melee about 100 women were arrested.

The rioting continued into the evening when squads of women attacked the residences of Sir Edward Grey, the foreign secretary; Winston Spencer Churchill, the home secretary; and Lewis Harcourt, secretary of state for the colonies. Stones crashed through the windows of the houses, Sir Edward Grey's bearing the brunt of the attack. One band sped August Birrell, chief secretary for Ireland, strolling through St. James Park to the Athenaeum Club and swooped down upon the aged statesman knocking his hat over his eyes and kicking him about the legs. When help came and the woman were driven off Mr. Birrell limped to his motor car on the arms of policemen.

Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the leader of the suffragettes, was among those taken to jail. Her sister, Mrs. Grant, denied admittance, threw a missile through the jail window. She also was incarcerated. Miss Grace Johnson was the only American arrested.

## TRUNK MYSTERY UNSOLVED.

Albert C. Callier, the French artist, whose body it was, according to police theory, that was found in a trunk marked with the name "W. Lewis," in the basement of the apartments in west Fifty-fourth street, New York, on Thursday last, was last seen alive by a close friend of his in the middle of the month of June, 1902. At the time he had a ticket for France on the French line, and between \$10,000 and \$12,000 in his possession.

Callier disappeared after that date. He did not return to his home in France. He was not seen in New York. A brother of his, Rene Callier, with whom Albert had been associated in an ivory company in Sierra Leone, on the west coast of Africa, went to New York, in the spring of the following year, in search of the missing man. The African merchant laid the case before the French consul in New York and a search was instituted. So far as is known Albert C. Callier has never been accounted for since that time.

The wife of Simon Fruitkin, a tailor, his two small children and a servant were crushed to death by the collapse of a new concrete Mercantile building in Cleveland, Ohio, last night. An explosion of unknown origin is believed to have caused the disaster.
