THE REVOLUTION IN MEXICO.

A dispatch from Ciudad Porfirio Diaz, Mexico, says Francisco I. Madero has proclaimed himself "president of the provisional government of Mexico" and admonishes his followers not to commit overt acts against Americans nor do damage to property of foreigners. Madero's proclamation is being generally circulated throughout northern Mexico.

The proclamation states that foreigners need have no fear of an attack by the revolutionists. Banks are not to be molested.

"This movement is solely directed against the tyrant Diaz," says the circular, "and Americans as well as other foreigners can rest in safety. No foreign business house is to be touched and foreigners need not fear an attack. We are solely in opposition to the despot, and are working to obtain our constitutional rights."

Francisco I. Madero, who, according to a dispatch from Ciudad Porfirio Diaz, has proclaimed himself "president of the provisional government of Mexico," is a fugitive from justice, having been convicted in the Mexican courts on November 19 of inciting the people to rebellion. He was a candidate at the last elections for the presidency in opposition to General Diaz and Ricardo Flores Magón. When Diaz was continued in power Madero disappeared.

Madero is credited with being the head of the revolutionary movement. The importance of the reported proclamation, however, may be less than appears on the face of it, as during his campaign for the presidency circulars purporting to have been sent out by the candidate announced him as "the constitutional president of Mexico."

Employees of the Federal telegraph lines in Ciudad Porfirio Diaz say that he has surrendered and that the Maderists now infest the city. All arms and ammunition there have been confiscated by them, but the owners were told to call at headquarters at Lerdo, where they would be paid for the guns.

Gen. Fructuoso Garcia, commanding the Mexican troops in Ciudad Porfirio Diaz said Diaz has the situation well in hand.

A tale of horror which made a large audience mutter threats of lynching, as it listened to the story of the murder of Mrs. Mary Richards, at Ancheys station, near Pottsville, Pa., was told by the murderer himself, Frank Mitchell, alias Joseph Christock, on the witness stand in court.

Mitchell told how he murdered Mrs. Richards, then beat her daughter, Mrs. Peter Faulds, insensible. Faulds, the husband of the outraged woman, was that he had to be carried out of the courtroom. Mitchell confessed on the stand that he was superstitious the day of the murder. He said, brokenly, being a foreigner:

"I heard a dog moaning. I had heard people say that that was the sign of death. I heard this dog moan and I didn't know whose death it might mean. I thought it might be me."

"Mrs. Faulds sat shelling corn in the storeroom. I threw the horse lines over her. I picked her up. She gave a kind of scream and I put a cushion over her face. I started to carry her upstairs. Half way up I put her down. I stumbled to the bottom and my head was out. There was blood which I thought was from my nose.

"Mrs. Richards, with a butcher knife came for me. The gun was in the stairway. I picked up the gun. I asked her what she was going to do? She answered: 'Never mind, wait, you'll see.' She braced herself between two doors. The gun I did not lift to my shoulder, it fired. Mrs. Richards stood there for 10 minutes, calling her daughter Lizzie: 'If you're not dead answer me.'"

"She fell down the cellarway. I pushed the cellar door shut. The pot of blood I covered with a piece of carpet."

The murderer then left for Reading, where he was captured. He said he had intended to make his way to the west.

CRIPPEN LOST NERVE.

The early reports from London which represented Dr. H. H. Crippen as showing remarkable nerve at his execution are said to have been erroneous.

The condemned man, who throughout his trial and even until Home Secretary Churchill had refused a petition for his reprieve, had maintained an imperturbable calmness, presented a pitiable appearance as he was literally led through the short corridor from his cell to the scaffold. His mental anguish had been too great to be covered up by the short bravado, and it was a broken man whom the warden was obliged to assist up the steps to the drop upon which, once reached, the shrinking figure all but collapsed.

The foreman of the jury inquired of the coroner if he might ask whether any confession had been made and received the reply, "No; that does not concern you."

The first report that Crippen had met his fate calmly was contradicted by persons who were present in the prison during his last hours. The doomed man passed a restless night and appeared haggard and worn when awakened from his fitful slumber. He seemed to lose all fortitude as the end approached. Breakfast was brought to him, but he left it untouched.

The London Daily Mail says that while Crippen was in bed Tuesday night he removed the glasses from his spectacles and broke them, with the apparent intention of committing suicide by opening a vein. His movements attracted the attention of the warden, who was watching him, and they immediately searched him. They found fragments of glass hidden in his underclothing.

BROKE RECORD.

J. Armstrong Drexel broke the world's aviation record in a flight from Point Breeze, near Philadelphia, yesterday afternoon. The barograph recorded 9,970 feet. The best previous record—9,714 feet—was made by Ralph Johnstone on October 24 at Belmont park.

It was late in the afternoon when Drexel went up for the record. He was soon out of sight and landed west of Philadelphia. It was reported at the aviation field that he had broken Johnstone's record of 9,714, but the exact figures were not known. Drexel departed from Oreland near Philadelphia, that he thought he had reached a height of nearly 10,000 feet. He was in the air about an hour and a half.

Drexel would not be certain until his barograph is read.

Mr. Drexel said it was very cold in the air and that he could not go any farther, as his engine began to work badly. He had the machine, a Beriot monoplane, owned by Grahame-White, tilted upward, but she would go no farther. He landed in a field and was a bit sick when he touched the earth.

A member of the Aero Club of Pennsylvania telephoned the private residence at Oreland, near where Drexel landed, that the barograph he had not opened until it was brought back to Philadelphia. When the officials got at the records they showed Drexel had 9,970 feet and the world's record to his credit.
