MRS. GLOVER TO MARRY.
Mrs. Lillian W. Glover, widow of Clarence F. Glover, who was murdered in Waltham, Mass., about a year ago, said yesterday that she is to be married within a year to a wealthy Washington physician. Mrs. Glover smiled, and put her hand in a bag from which she withdrew a fat letter.
"This is from him," she said, beaming. "I get five, six, and sometimes ten letters like this a day. He is a southerner, and you know what southerners are. He writes the loveliest letters. He is a rich doctor who lives in Washington."
"Do you remember the day I was on the witness stand all day, and they asked me, if I didn't want to have a chair? Well, that was the day this doctor became interested in me. I have had letters every day since. We are to be married within a year."

A sackful of mail for Hattie Le Blanc, the little French Canadian girl, who was acquitted by a jury Wednesday of the murder of Clarence F. Glover, was received at the Cambridge jail yesterday. There were hundreds of souvenir post cards, bearing messages of congratulation, and an immense pile of letters. The letters included many proposals of marriage, and several theatrical managers offered the girl a large salary for a stage contract. One Boston theatrical agent made an offer of \$500 a week.
Melvin M. Johnson, the girl's chief counsel, was swamped by letters and telegrams of congratulation. Hattie remains at Mr. Johnson's home in Cambridge. She will start in a few days for her old home in West Arichat, Cape Breton.

WANT TO BE ELECTROCUTED.
Rev. Thomas McKinley, of Battle Creek, Mich., has written to the governors of New York, New Jersey, West Virginia, and Ohio asking them to have him put to death in the electric chair. McKinley is 55 years old and has been blind from birth. He overcame his infirmity sufficiently to become a minister, but of late years has had no pastor. In his letters to the governors he says:

"I am not and seemingly cannot be profitably employed, therefore I cannot consistently have a home and a wife. I must live in the poorhouse among lunatics, idiots, broken-down drunkards and vagabonds, where there will be an end to aspiration, and where I will be slowly murdered. Surely under such circumstances it is the duty of the state to take my life in the most painless way possible. Therefore I hope the governor of some state where they electrocute people will permit my life to be taken in that painless way."

DON'T GET ENOUGH TIPS.
Pullman porters have sent a petition to the general manager of the Pullman Company asking for an increase in wages. The petition says:

"The growing tendency of the traveling public either to discontinue altogether or reduce to one-half or less the gratuities with which they formally rewarded Pullman porters who merited such consideration, and the high cost of living generally, have forced us to come through you to the Pullman Company begging for some relief."

A porter on one of the New York-Chicago flyers relating some of the hardships encountered told an accident which happened a couple of weeks ago on his train.

"The professor of the agricultural department in a certain university," said the porter, "brought 29 of his students to see the International stock show in Chicago. The professor told the students it was against the law of the state to give a tip." They traveled in my Pullman car. I blacked their shoes and brushed their clothes during the run, but did not receive a cent from the party. I worked all night scrubbing off the mud and polishing up those 30 pairs of shoes. In the morning I brushed the whole party off. Did I get anything for my polish and time? No, sir."

THE BEDOUIN REVOLT.

An Englishman who was an eye witness of some of the scenes of the recent Bedouin uprising in a detailed account sent to Jerusalem says: Several companies of troops, had been sent out with field guns to effect the disarmament of the Bedouins. The troops were scattered in small companies, among the various tribes in the district east of the Jordan when the revolt broke out.
The revolters moved on El Zerak, which is a town of about 2,000 inhabitants, located 20 miles east of the Dead sea. They massacred the government officials and their families, looted and burned the government buildings and schools, and robbed a party of eight American tourists. The latter suffered an injury.
It is asserted that the Christian residents and their buildings were spared. The party of Chicago tourists reported robbed in the Holy Land left Chicago September 7 in charge of Rev. W. B. Miller, a Dunkard. Rev. Mr. Miller has conducted several parties through the Holy Land and through friends there expected to be able to do without the assistance of the regular tourist companies. Mr. Miller carried most of the funds of the party, which numbered eighteen.
