THE TRIPLE TRAGEDY IN NORTH CAROLINA.
Because threats poured from all sides against Nathan Montague, charged with assaulting and murdering Miss Mattie Sanders, and with murdering her father, J. L. Sanders, and her niece, Irene Overton, at Overton, N. C., Sheriff Harvard yesterday afternoon rushed the negro across the country in an automobile to the state penitentiary, at Raleigh.
Sheriff Wheeler, of Oxford, in going to Durham with his almost frozen and half dressed prisoner, evaded the mob keeping its members from his track by pretending to go toward Roxboro, instead of Durham.
A blood-spattered well-house, with a knife beside it, gave the clue which led to the arrest of Montague, who lives in the neighborhood. In his house the bloody skirt of Mrs. Sanders, and other parts of her clothing, were found. Blood and Auburn hair also were found on the negro's clothes.
That the first intention was to throw her body into the well appears likely, copious quantities of blood having been found all about the place.
Suspicion fell upon Montague in a remarkable way. He had been helping an Overton family butcher hog. Miss Sanders also was there. While at work upon the slaughtered animals he was seen with a knife which is said to be that found near the well. A neighbor, immediately upon seeing it, exclaimed, "That's Nathan Montague's knife; he tried to sell it to me today."
The murder was discovered by neighbors, attracted by the fire, in the midst of which the bodies were visible. The old man and his granddaughter were close together, being found in the corner of the house, and the daughter was several feet away.
At the inquest yesterday it was declared that the girl's screams were heard about 10 o'clock, a pistol shot following cries of murder.
In the negro's home were found a pistol with three empty chambers and the bloody skirt, which was identified immediately by the girl's mother, who said she had worn it the same day. Mrs. Sanders was visiting in Oxford, and reached the scene yesterday afternoon.
Montague's wife, on the stand, declared she had never seen the skirt before.
With the exception of some explanations differing materially from those of his wife, Montague has said nothing to incriminate himself.

DUELS ON THE TAPIS.
A large number of duels are to be fought at Nagyvarad, Hungary, as a result of a dispute about the costume worn by the president of the local union of solicitors at a ball. It appears that the man in question attended a ball given by the Nagyvarad law students in a light blue summer suit and brown boots. The townfolks who had been invited interpreted this costume as an insult aimed at them. A meeting of the law students called to debate the question was of a very stormy nature. One hundred and twenty-two deadly insults, it is recorded, were offered, and are to be wiped out by a corresponding number of duels. The police had to break up the meeting. The duels are to be fought with swords.
An article was published in a radical newspaper in Madrid Monday night calling Deputy Myro, who was involved in a personal quarrel in the chamber Monday with Deputy Iglesias, a coward. When the question between them was settled Monday, in time to prevent a duel, Deputy Puente took part in the settlement, siding with Iglesias. It appears that Myro connected Puente with the publication referred to, and challenged him to meet him on the field of honor. The seconds of the two men met yesterday afternoon and made arrangements for a duel, which will probably be fought today.

SOUTHERN RAILWAY WINS.
A jury in the county court at Columbia, S. C., yesterday, returned a verdict in favor of the Southern Railway in the suit in which the state of South Carolina sought to dissolve the merger of the Southern and four state roads—the Asheville and Spartanburg Railroad, the South Carolina and Georgia, the Carolina and Georgia Extension, and the Carolina Midland. In his charge Judge Shippe held that competition existed in the constitutional prohibition of a merger of competing or overlapping lines, but that the merger applies to lines that commercially and legally. lines, the court held, could not be considered within the prohibitive clause. The state is expected to take an appeal.

CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS' GRAVES.

The House Monday passed the Senate joint resolution which extends for two years from date the time for marking the graves of the Confederate soldiers who died in northern prisons during the civil war. Ex-Senator James H. Berry, of Ark. was the committee member to superintend the work and will get \$5,000 a year for it. He succeeds the late ex-Gov. William C. Oates, of Alabama, in the position, which was formerly held by the late Congressman Elliott, of South Carolina.
The House also passed a bill providing that when it is impossible to identify the individual burial places of Confederate soldiers and sailors who died in northern prisons, and were buried near the prisons the secretary of war shall have erected central masonry monuments, upon which bronze tablets shall be placed, containing the names of those buried in the vicinity.

TEN MILLION REQUEST.

John D. Rockefeller yesterday gave the University of Chicago \$10,000,000 and severed his official relations with the institution.
The benefaction completes an amount of \$35,000,000, which he has given to the university since he founded it in 1889. The great school is to receive no further support from the oil king.
Announcement of the gift and the withdrawal of Mr. Rockefeller from any control of the university was made by Martin A. Ryerson, president of the board of trustees, at the seventy-seventh convocation of the university yesterday.

STUMBLING OVER CORPSE.

Ambrose Wilson, a young Jersey City business man, returned to his boarding place on Johnson avenue, early yesterday after a belated evening visit with friends and tumbled head-first over the body of his father, Frank Wilson, in the hallway.
The old man's body was cold and he had been dead apparently for several hours. Examination showed that he had been terribly beaten with some heavy implement and finally killed by a stab in the neck, which severed the jugular vein.
The police arrested August Miller on the charge of murder and held, his wife Jane as a witness. The Millers own the house and the two Wilsons, father and son, had boarded with them for several years.
