PASSING OF THE FERRY

Steamer Alexandria to be Taken off Route at the Close of the Day

When the ferry steamer Alexandria leaves her slip at this port for Washington at 5:20 this evening she will not return, and during the next few days she will bid adieu to the Potomac river. Her career hereabouts has been short—about fifteen months.

The passing of the ferry between Alexandria and Washington does not, of course block intercourse between the two cities by water, as other steamers stop at this port on their way up and down the river. But their trips are made at long intervals, and besides they do not carry teams.

Most of the transportation of passengers between Alexandria and Washington has since 1896, the years the electric railway was built, been accomplished by rail, and the trains, which are operated at short intervals, afford an easy and rapid route.

The abolition of the ferry will not necessarily concentrate all the freight service to the electric trains, as motor boats are being multiplied year by year, and already they are being utilized in the transportation of many articles of commerce. Such boats are being used extensively on the lower river, and they arrive and depart from Alexandria daily.

FIRST BAPTIST WINS.

The First Baptists easily defeated the Methodist Protestants at the Ball Park yesterday by the score of 12 to 5.

POLICE TO HAVE LISTS.

Owners of Canines Slow in Applying For Licenses For Their Pets.

This evening at four o'clock the city auditor will furnish police headquarters a book which is arranged alphabetically, giving the names, residences, etc., of persons to whom license have been issued to keep dogs. The lists show that licenses have been issued to the number of 565, which is 125 less than a year ago, when 690 were issued to July 28.

It is said that at least 1,000 dogs are in Alexandria. Seven hundred and thirty eight were licensed last year and some forty or fifty destroyed.

It is a noticeable fact that some persons residing in the very center of the city have not applied for license for their dogs, while two persons residing at the very end of the city limits—indeed, on the county of Fairfax line—were among the first to apply for licenses for their canines, each paying on three.

Of the 565 issued to 2 o'clock this afternoon 134 were paid for by colored persons.

It is a chronic source of complaint from persons who pay taxes upon dogs annually that a large percentage of the owners or harborers of the animals pay little or no attention to the law.

The matter is now up to the police and it is hoped they will use every means of enforcing the law against all delinquents.

THE MARKET.

The market this morning was abundantly supplied with country produce, but prices in the main were firm. Lima beans, which had been held at 40 cents a quart during the week had declined to 25 cents. The market was glutted with cabbage, and a barrel of this variety of vegetable could have been purchased for 50 cents. Meat, however, the essential to this dish, was still at the high water mark. There was an abundance of blackberries and other fruits on the benches of the country people.

COMPULSORY SEWER TAPPING.

Among the cases before the Police Court this morning was that of a grocer who had been cited to appear and show cause why he should not be fined for allowing other than rain water to run across his pavement. The accused did not appear but he sent counsel to represent him. The latter stated that the water came from an ice box in the store and that it was the purpose of the proprietor to lay a drain pipe under the side walk in order that the water could reach the gutter. Justice Caton informed counsel that such a procedure would be unlawful from the fact that a sewer had been placed on the street where the store is situated.

The charge was dismissed upon the assurance that the party complained of would connect with the sewer. According to the law, nothing but rain water is allowed to flow from premises which are upon streets or alleys where sewers have been constructed. The law, however, has not been strictly enforced from the fact that but few cases have found their way into Police Court.
