

NEWS OF THE DAY.

Clementine Bernabet the negress, who in a period of several months killed nineteen persons, with an axe, each as they slept in LaFayette, La., was convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment yesterday.

The steamship Asiatic Prince, which reached New York yesterday, from Brazilian ports, brought details of the rescue of thirteen men from the burning steamship Fagundes Varela, sighted off the Brazilian coast on the morning of October 7.

All hope of finding Charles Fox, the 11-year-old boy and his mongrel dog, who drifted to sea from Coney Island in a row boat Thursday, was abandoned early yesterday when the police discovered an oarless and empty boat which had come ashore near Coney Island.

On account of a number of threatening letters received by Colonel Roosevelt, and the presence in Oyster Bay of a stranger, who attempted yesterday to make his way into the Colonel's house, steps were taken tonight to guard the life of the former president.

Roosevelt has instructed his counsel to begin criminal and civil libel suits against George S. Newett, publisher of the Iron Ore, a weekly newspaper printed in Ishpeming, Mich. The suits are based on a article printed in this paper on October 12, headed "The Roosevelt Way."

Much Married Man.

Addison Francis Ellsworth, of Riverside, Cal., is under arrest in Philadelphia charged with embezzlement, forgery, obtaining money under false pretences, and with bigamy. He is also charged with statutory offences against two young girls, one of whom is his own child.

The police have traced the man's past history, and they say that they are ready to prove that he has married ten women without securing a divorce from any of them, and that by these wives he is the father of sixteen children.

He made a habit of never living with a wife after she had borne him two children, and of the ten to whom he was wedded he had two children by five of them. In addition to the other six who were each the mother of a child, he is also accused of being the father of two children of women to whom he was never married.

Ellsworth began his matrimonial career in Frederick, Md., when 17 years old. He had been in the employ of an insurance company and is said to have exercised hypnotic power inducing women to take out policies.

Requisition Honored.

Richmond, Va., Oct. 26.—A requisition from Governor Woodrow Wilson, of New Jersey, Democratic candidate for president, was on Thursday afternoon honored at the office of Governor Mann for the return of Charles Johnson, wanted for larceny. Johnson is charged with the theft of an automobile, which he is alleged to have appropriated from a New Jersey physician August 8 last, and in which he made his way into Dixie.

Rally at Manassas.

Manassas, Oct. 26.—There will be a big political rally at Manassas, beginning at 2 o'clock this afternoon, when a number of prominent speakers will make addresses. Among those who are on the programme to speak are Representative Oscar Underwood, Senators Claude A. Swanson and Thomas S. Martin, and Representative C. C. Carlin.

Alleged Incendiary.

Richmond, Va., Oct. 26.—Colonel Joseph Buton, state insurance commissioner, received information today of the arrest on three warrants of C. W. Briggs, of the firm of Briggs and Welfrey, dairymen, doing business in the suburbs of Berkeley, Norfolk county, Va., the accused being charged with house-burning.

Each of the three warrants charges house-burning. The first charges the prisoner with setting fire to and destroying a stable, together with two horses and one mule and other contents, belonging to the firm of Briggs and Welfrey, the night of September 18th last.

The second warrant charges the destruction by fire of a cow barn, together with sixteen cows, all belonging to the firm of Briggs & Welfrey.

Briggs was lodged in the Norfolk county jail at Portsmouth. He has been bonded in the sum of \$3,000 for appearance at a preliminary hearing at South Norfolk, Monday, October 28.

AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance empowering and instructing the Mayor of the City of Alexandria to execute a contract on behalf of the City Council of Alexandria with the Southern Railway Company, in reference to the construction, maintenance and operation of a certain sidetrack.

This agreement made and entered into this... day of ... 1912, by and between the Southern Railway Company a corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Virginia, hereinafter for convenience styled the Railway Company, party of the first part, and the City Council of Alexandria, Virginia, party of the second part.

Witnesseth, that the Railway Company, for and in consideration of the covenants of the party of the second part, hereinafter expressed, agrees:

(1) That it will lay, construct and operate an industrial track at Alexandria, in the State of Virginia, to spring from the Union street track of the Railway Company at a point near Pendleton street, in said city, and to extend across Pendleton and Oronoco streets into the property of the said party of the second part, known as the City Gas Works.

(2) That as a condition precedent to any obligation on the part of the Railway Company to begin the construction and operation of said industrial trestle track, the party of the second part shall advance and pay to the Railway Company, upon demand, the sum of thirty-one hundred (\$31,000) dollars, said sum being one-half the estimated cost of the construction of said industrial trestle track; provided, however, that if the actual cost of the construction of said industrial trestle track shall upon completion thereof, be found to be less than, or in excess of, the said estimated cost, the one-half the difference between such actual and estimated cost shall, if the actual cost in excess of the said estimated cost, be paid to the Railway Company by the party of the second part promptly upon demand, but if the actual cost is less than the said estimated cost, such difference shall be repaid to the party of the second part by the Railway Company, after the completion of said industrial trestle track. It being understood that the said industrial trestle track shall be constructed upon the following basis, i. e., the party of the second part shall pay one-half the actual cost of construction in the first instance.

(3) That the Railway Company shall have entire control of said industrial trestle track and the operation thereof, and may use the same as well for the business of third persons well as for the business of the party of the second part, hereto, as for that of the party of the second part hereto; provided, however, that such use of said industrial trestle track for the benefit of third persons shall not unreasonably interfere with the business of the party of the second part.

(4) That the party of the second part will indemnify and save harmless the Railway Company against any and all damages resulting from negligence of the party of the second part, its servants and employees in and about said industrial trestle track and the right of way therefor, and furthermore, against any and all claims, demands, suits, judgments or sums of money accruing for loss or damage by fire, communicated by locomotive engines or trains of Railway Company to buildings used by the party of the second part, in connection with the business served by said industrial trestle track, or to other property owned by or with the consent of the party of the second part upon or near said industrial trestle track. The Railway Company hereby stipulates for its protection, herein expressed, to afford the above described terminal service and facilities to the party of the second part elsewhere than at its regular station.

(5) That the party of the second part will ship, or cause to be shipped, over the lines of the Railway Company and its connections, all freights used or produced in or about the business of the party of the second part; provided, however, that rate are afforded said party of the second part by the Railway Company, which are not in excess of those of competing carriers for similar services performed under substantially similar circumstances and conditions.

(6) That the said party of the second part shall, at its own expense and cost, maintain the said trestle track and keep the same at all times in repair. And it is mutually covenanted and agreed:

(7) That either party hereto may terminate this agreement at any time hereafter, but upon (60) days notice, in writing, to the other, of the intention so to do; in which event, upon the taking effect of such notice, the Railway Company may discontinue the operation of said industrial trestle track and remove its property, including all fixtures, therefrom and from the right of way appurtenant thereto.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the Southern Railway Company has caused its corporate name to be signed hereto by its president, and its corporate seal affixed hereto by its president, and the City Council of Alexandria has caused its corporate name to be signed hereto and its corporate seal affixed hereto by Thomas A. Fisher, Mayor of the city of Alexandria, on the ... day of ... 1912.

Section (2). That the Mayor of the City of Alexandria is hereby authorized and directed to execute the said contract, by signing thereto the corporate name and affixing thereto the corporate seal of the City Council of Alexandria, and upon the execution of the said contract by the Southern Railway Company to deliver said contract,

or a copy thereof, to the Southern Railway Company, as and for the act and deed of the City Council of Alexandria. Section (3). This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage.
