OFFICIAL Board of Aldermen.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen of the City of Alexandria, Va., held March 25, 1913, there were present:

F. F. Marbury, President; and Messrs. Hill, Ballenger, Ogden, Field, Fitzgerald and Summers.

An ordinance to amend sections 23, 24, 25 and 34 of the health laws of the City of Alexandria was referred to the Committees on Health and General Laws.

A communication was received from E. C. Dunn, City Engineer, in reference to paving streets and concerning the reduction in the price of the same.

Ordinances directing the Southern Railway Company to take up its rails on Wilkes street between the east and west lines of Washington street to lay rails approved by the committee on Streets and the City Engineer, and to grade and pave between the tracks and two feet on both sides thereof; also an ordinance directing the said company to take up its rails on Wilkes street at the intersection of Royal and lay rails to be approved by the Committee on Streets and the City Engineer, and to pave between the same and on both sides of their track, were referred to the Committee on Streets.

An ordinance directing the Washington-Virginia Railway Company to take up its rails on Cameron street between the east and west building lines of Payne street and lay groove rails and to pave between and on both sides of their track, was referred to the Committee on Streets.

A petition of sundry citizens for laying a pipe sewer on Columbus street, between Pendleton and Wythe was referred to the Committee on Streets.

An ordinance to prevent dogs from running at large in the city of Alexandria and to provide for the extermination of unlicensed and ownerless dogs, was received from the Common Council. The action of the Board was non-concurred in and Messrs. Ogden and Fitzgerald were appointed a committee of conference. The committee recommended that the ordinance be passed with the words "in a manner approved by the Police Department" stricken out. The ordinance as amended was passed by the following vote: Ayes, Messrs. Hill, Ballenger, Ogden, Field, Fitzgerald, Summers and Mrs. President—7. Noes, none.

An ordinance regulating the speed of automobiles and other vehicles in the City of Alexandria, and providing certain regulations for vehicles in using the streets, was received from the Common Council.

The ordinance provided a speed of ten miles an hour on King street, and upon motion it was amended and made to read "twelve," by the following vote: Ayes—Messrs. Hill, Ballenger, Field, Fitzgerald, Summers and Mr. President—5. Noes, Messrs. Field and Ogden—2.

The ordinance was then passed by the following vote: Ayes—Messrs. Hill, Ballenger, Field, Fitzgerald, Summers and Mr. President—5. Noes, Messrs. Field and Ogden—1.

The ordinance was subsequently returned by the Common Council, that Board having non-concurred in the amendment made by the Aldermen, and Messrs. Ballenger and Summers were appointed a committee of conference. The committee reported that the Aldermen committee had insisted upon the action of this board in amending the ordinance.

An ordinance to prohibit roller skating on sidewalks of the city of Alexandria was received from the Common Council and passed by the following vote:

Ayes, Messrs. Hill, Ogden, Field, Fitzgerald, Summers and Mr. President—6. Noes, Mr. Ballenger—1.

The following was received from the Common Council and their action concurred in by unanimous votes: Report of Committee on Streets on a petition of E. Heidenheimer for permission to install a burglar alarm with the station house.

Resolution providing for an appropriation of \$300 to purchase a motor cycle for the use of the police department.

Petition of sundry citizens for an extension of the gas mains on Patrick street, between Wythe and Madison.

Petition of W. S. Nicklin for permission to renew frame wing to residence, 319 south Pitt street.

Resolution providing for an appropriation of \$300 for the purchase of a horse for the Columbia Steam Fire Engine Company.

Opinion of the Corporation Attorney on the power of the Committee on Light, compensation to act as Superintendent of Gas and other employees, etc.

An ordinance to amend and re-enact an ordinance to provide for the creation of the office and election of a superintendent of gas.

An ordinance making it unlawful to display within the city of Alexandria, Virginia, any picture, moving picture, film or real illustrating or representing the commission of a crime or attempt to commit any crime.

A resolution requesting the Police Department to put the dog wagon in operation at once was received from the Common Council. The Aldermen amended the resolution by substituting the words "Mayor" instead of "police department," and in this shape passed the same.

An ordinance to prohibit roller skating on the sidewalks of the city of Alexandria was recommended by joint Committee on streets and general laws, amended and read the second and third time and passed. Ayes,

Messrs. Burke, Smith, Williams, Birrell, Monroe, Brockett, Harrison, Swan, Marshall, Bryan and Mr. President, (11). Noes, Messrs. Leadbeater and Chauncey, (2).

An ordinance making it unlawful to display within the city of Alexandria, Virginia, any picture, moving picture, film or real illustrating or representing the commission or attempt to commit any crime, was recommended by the Committee on General Laws and read the second and third times and passed. Ayes, 14; noes, 0.

An ordinance to prevent dogs from running at large in the City of Alexandria, Virginia, and to provide for the extermination of licensed and ownerless dogs was recommended by the Committee on General Laws, amended and read three times and passed. Ayes, Messrs. Spinks, Leadbeater, Smith, Williams, Birrell, Monroe, Harrison, Swan, Marshall, Bryan, Chauncey and Mr. President. (1). Noes, 0.

The ordinance was returned from the Board of Aldermen non concurred in and a committee of conference requested. Messrs. Smith and Swan were appointed to confer. The committee reported that they had agreed to strike out the words "In a Manner Approved by the Police Department". The ordinance was returned from the Board of Aldermen, passed as amended, and Council recessed from its previous action and concurred in the action of the Board of Aldermen.

An ordinance regulating the speed of automobiles and other vehicles in the City of Alexandria, and providing regulations was recommended by the Joint Committee on Streets and General Laws, amended, and read the second and third time and passed. Ayes, 14; noes, 0. The ordinance was returned from the Board of Aldermen, passed by striking out "ten miles per hour on King street," and inserting "twelve miles per hour. Messrs. Williams and Swan were appointed a committee of conference. The committee reported that they could not agree on the amendment. Upon motion of Mr. Monroe, Council recessed from the previous action and concurred with the Board of Aldermen. Ayes, Messrs. Spinks, Williams, Birrell, Harrison, Swan, Marshall, Chauncey and Mr. President. (8). Noes, Messrs. Leadbeater, Burke, Smith, Monroe, Brockett, Bryan, (6).

An ordinance to provide for the grading and paving of roadway on Cameron street, Pitt street to St. Asaph street, was called from the table and passed. Ayes, 14; noes, 0.

An ordinance to provide for the grading and paving of roadway on Payne street, Cameron to Queen street was called from the table and passed. Ayes, 14; noes, 0.

An opinion of the Corporation Attorney in the power of the Committee on Light to regulate compensation to Mr. Frank Latham in charge of the City Gas Works was received.

An ordinance to amend and re-enact an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to provide for the creation of a Superintendant of Gas, and to define his duties and powers," approved March 14th, 1900, was referred to the Committee on Light.

A resolution appropriating \$300 to purchase a horse for the use of the Columbia Fire Engine Company was recommended by the Fire Committee and passed. Ayes, 14; noes, 0.

A resolution authorizing the police department to put the dog wagon in operation at once and appropriating \$100 for the purpose was offered by Mr. Birrell and passed. Ayes, 14; noes, 0. The resolution was returned from the Board of Aldermen passed by striking out "Police Department" and inserting the word "Mayor." Council recessed from its previous action and concurred in the action of the Board of Aldermen.

A petition from W. S. Nicklin to erect frame addition at 319 S. Pitt street, was referred to the Committee on streets.

A petition for extension of gas mains northward on Patrick street between Oronoco and Madison streets was referred to the Committee on Light.

A resolution by Mr. Birrell appropriating \$300 to purchase a motor cycle for the use of the police Department was referred to the Joint Committee on Finance and Police.

The following was received from the Board of Aldermen and their action concurred in:

A report of E. C. Dunn, City Engineer, also an ordinance to amend the health laws of the city and also an ordinance directing the Southern Railway Company to take up its rails on Wilkes street at Royal street and lay rails to be approved by the Committee on streets and the City Engineer.
