TO BE BURIED IN RICHMOND.

Capt. John S. Wise's Body to Rest in Hollywood.

Richmond, Va., May 14.—The funeral of Capt. John S. Wise, former congressman from Virginia, and owner of Kiptopeake, in Northampton county, who died at noon Monday, near Princess Anne, Md., at the home of his son, Henry A. Wise, will be held in this city Thursday. The burial will be in Hollywood cemetery with military honors, Company A of the Richmond Light Infantry Blues Battalion as well as other organizations will be among those represented at the obsequies.

Captain Wise was in command of the Blues when that command left the First Virginia Infantry in 1878 and reorganized as an independent command.

The body of Captain Wise will arrive in Richmond Thursday morning.

PRUSSIAN GENERAL KILLED.

A Supposed Lunatic Fired Several Shots at Major General and Also Kills Police Sergeant.

Munich, Bavaria, May 14.—Major General Von Lewinski, to Prussian military attaché to Bavaria, was killed here yesterday by a supposed lunatic, who fired three revolver shots at him. A sergeant of police was also killed.

The man, whose name is Straffer, attacked the general on a crowded street, first firing several shots at him and then turning his weapon on Police Sergeant Pellender, who rushed to the officer's assistance. The man was killed by a shot through the heart. General Von Lewinski was still alive when picked up. He was taken to the hospital in an ambulance, but died shortly afterward. The assassin was meanwhile seized by a crowd of people who tried to lynch him and succeeded in seriously injuring him before he was rescued by the police.

General Von Lewinski was an officer of the general staff and occupied an important position in the scheme of co-operation of the Prussian and Bavarian armies.

NEW TRIAL GRANTED.

Sensation is Caused at First Hearing in Case of William White.

Charlottesville, Va., May 14.—William White, the youthful looking young man who was convicted here at 6:35 o'clock Friday evening of the charge of murdering his stepfather, Louis Spiers, and given eighteen years in the penitentiary, has been granted a new trial by Judge Fishburne, who presided at the first hearing of the case.

Judge Duke spoke for the prosecution, Messrs. Wood, McNutt and Walker spoke in behalf of the young prisoner, endeavoring to show that the killing was justifiable on the grounds of self-protection.

J. H. Weeks was foreman of the jury which convicted the young man. George Walker, of counsel for the defense, caused a sensation when he arose and promised to bring forward several bills of exception on the grounds of "errors apparent on the face of the record," because an "outsider was present in the jury room at the time of the deliberation of the case," and because the commonwealth's attorney in the course of his speech, alluded to the fact that "all of the disabilities resting on the prisoner had been removed."

GIRL SWALLOWS POISON.

Laura Hawkins is Dying as Result of Eating Paris Green.

Berryville, Va., May 14.—Laura Hawkins, 14 years old, is reported to be in a dying condition in her home at Boyce, Clarke county, as a result of eating a large quantity of Paris green, taken Monday afternoon, it is thought, with suicidal intent.

It is not yet known whether the girl was in love. It is reported, however, that she was unhappy over home affairs, and recently disagreed with her stepmother.

The girl is a daughter of John Ephraim Hawkins, a widely known and highly-esteemed farmer of Clarke county. No hope is entertained for her recovery.

SAVES TRAIN FROM BOMBS.

Dynamite So Placed as to Have Exploded Magazine Also.

Uniontown, Pa., May 14.—Nine sticks of dynamite, carefully placed under the rails of the Monongahela Railroad near Leckrone, were found by an unidentified alien yesterday a few minutes before the regular passenger train, which was carrying \$20,000 to pay the mines of the Consolidated Coke Company, was scheduled to pass the spot.

The foreigner hurriedly took the explosive to Station Agent Catherman at Leckrone and Catherman flagged the passenger train and with the conductor made an investigation.

The dynamite had been placed at a spot only 75 yards from the magazine of the Cameron Powder Company, in which were stored 20,000 pounds of powder and 500 pounds of dynamite. The concussion of the dynamite under the rails, had it been exploded, would probably have set off the magazine.

The tall spire of the Knox Presbyterian Church in Stratford, Ontario, 160 feet above the curb, was struck by lightning early yesterday, and in the ensuing fire the chief of police, the fire chief, and a policeman were killed and a fireman was mortally injured. The three men who lost their lives were buried beneath the burning belfry when it toppled and fell. The fireman was laid out with a blow on the head from a flying timber. The blaze ate its way to the heart of the building and burned itself out. The loss is about \$50,000.

JEALOUSY CAUSED MURDER.

Fears Relative of Boy Rival He Killed.

Farmville, Va., May 14.—Further details of the killing of Meade Hanes, 16 years old, by Mott Robinson Glover, 39 years old, on the farm of the boy's father, Supervisor J. B. Hanes, near Well Water, Buckingham county, were received here, when it was learned that the slayer hurried to jail to escape injury at the hands of the enraged relatives and friends of the victim.

Glover seems to be of a quiet temperament and has had little to say concerning his crime since he was locked up. Immediately after killing the boy last Monday afternoon, Glover jumped upon his horse and rode as fast as possible to the Buckingham county jail, fearing that he would meet his victim's father unless he was placed in prison before the meeting of the board of supervisors, which the parent was attending adjourned.

Mr. Hanes was not informed of his son's tragic death until after Glover was placed in jail. From best information obtainable it seems that Glover killed the boy while suffering from a fit of jealousy. Meade Hanes and Glover were in love with the same girl. Meade's love seemed to be reciprocated by the girl.

The slayer is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Glover, of Buckingham county, and a nephew of R. G. Glover, of Lynchburg. He spends much of his time in prison smoking cigarette and saying that he regrets his act which has placed him in such a bad plight.

Negro Robber Shoots Two Men.

Richmond, Va., May 14.—N. W. Maceoek, proprietor of a store at Dumbarton, six miles from Richmond, is suffering from a broken arm and two or more pistol shot wounds, and his son, Bernard, aged 18, is desperately wounded as the result of an attempt to rob the store shortly before 5 o'clock yesterday morning.

A negro went to the place, saw the proprietor take a bunch of bills from the safe and struck him, breaking his arm. Bernard went to his father's assistance, and was shot in the breast. The boy shot the negro, who escaped, leaving a trail of blood. Detectives and bloodhounds have been rushed to the scene.

WORSHIP AS CHURCH BURNS.

Pastor And People Save the Pews. Then Gather for Prayer.

Williamsport, Pa., May 14.—While the timbers of the burned church still smoked, Rev. William M. Taylor directed the congregation of the Tombs Run Methodist Church in planting pews saved from a fire that destroyed the church building; then he conducted a short service in the man at Leckrone and Catherman open.

The fire started when sparks from a stove fell upon the roof, and there was no way of fighting the flames.


