

NEWS OF THE DAY.

Finding William Miller, a prominent business man and churchman, and Mrs. Whitten together in the beautiful Whitten home at Williamsburg, W. Va., Tuesday night, J. R. Whitten, a wealthy coal operator, proceeded to send a bullet through Miller's hat, and when the latter attempted to draw a gun first with his right hand, Whitten shot his fingers away. Desperate and cornered, Miller tried to draw with his left hand, but again Whitten's accurate shooting winged Miller, disabling his remaining hand. Miller and Mrs. Whitten were arrested on a misdemeanor charge.

Mrs. Edith Trimmer Hood, an 18-year-old bride died yesterday in Toronto, Ohio, from injuries received on her wedding day, three weeks ago, when she jumped from a wagon to escape serenaders. After the wedding Hood and her bride were surrounded by friends and lifted into a farm wagon. Mrs. Hood jumped from the wagon, and in doing so tripped on straw and fell headlong. Unconscious she was carried into her mother's home. A blood clot formed on her brain.

When Constable George Bird, of Farrell, Pa., with a warrant charging disorderly conduct, went to arrest "Big Annie" Long—weight about 550 pounds—he whistled. When Bird reached the Long home he found that "Big Annie" had prepared for his coming. Answering the constable's knock with an invitation to come in, "Big Annie" informed Bird that her clothes were hidden, and he could take her as she was. Calling Policeman Fisher, Bird got a drag, and the two officers then tore down several lace curtains, with which they adorned "Big Annie" and carried her off to the "Big Annie" regularly chastise her husband.

Nails and screwdrivers, concealed in their sleeves were used yesterday by girls employed at the Jacob Gerhardt shirt factory in Hazelton, Pa., when approached by pickets of the mine workers' union and other labor crafts and asked to remain away from their places because some of the hands are still on strike since the inception of trouble at the plant in the winter.

A series of extraordinary incidents marked the running of the Derby over the course at Epsom Downs Eng., yesterday. Miss Emily Wilding, Davison militant suffragette, rushed into the track as the large field of horses swept around Tottenham Corner and grabbed the bridle of the King's horse, "Anmer" causing the animal to rear and fall, burying both his jockey and Miss Davison. In the melee which followed, both the jockey, Herbert Jones, and Miss Davison were seriously injured by the flying hoofs of the frightened animal. Miss Davison lies in a critical condition and it is believed that she will not survive.

Postmaster L. W. Duro, of Memphis, Tenn., in the Federal Court yesterday was found guilty on four counts, charging him with receiving money for political purposes. A fine of \$1 and costs on each count was assessed. Because of ignorance of the law Duro was only technically guilty.

Damage exceeding \$75,000 was done early yesterday by a softening "arson squad" which set fire to a newly constructed, but unoccupied mansion at Westwood, near Frowbridge, Wiltshire, England.






