Richard Evelyn Byrd, and Mrs. Byrd. The ceremony will take place in Christ Protestant Episcopal Church, Winchester, on the evening of Tuesday, October 7th. Mr. Byrd is a nephew of the Hon. Henry D. Flood, member of the House of Representatives for the Tenth Virginia district.

### Proprietor of Ark Takes Appeal to the Corporation Court

The chronic question whether or not certain persons can sell liquor from boats or arks in the Potomac on the confines of Alexandria was again before the Police Court yesterday evening. John Arrington, who operates an ark which had been towed opposite Jones's Point on Sunday mornings and from which liquor has been dispensed, was the defendant in the case. He had been arrested at an early hour last Sunday morning and the stock of spirituous and malt liquors in the ark seized. He was represented by R. D. Brumback and Commonwealth's Attorney S. G. Brent conducted the prosecution. The warrant under which Arrington was arraigned virtually charged him with maintaining a nuisance by selling liquor on Sundays.

A number of witnesses were examined and the fact was established that liquor had been sold on the ark, which was fitted up with barroom fixtures, and that persons were transported to and from the ark gratis. It was also shown that the beer disposed of in the floating bar was procured in Alexandria.

While people residing in the southeastern section of the city who were put on the stand admitted that parties under the influence of liquor passed and repassed their homes on Sundays, none could say positively that the liquor from which such individuals were suffering had been procured on the ark.

Mr. Brumback, after all witnesses had been examined, moved that the charge against his client be dismissed, as he alleged the Commonwealth had failed to prove that Arrington had committed a nuisance nor was he maintaining one.

Mr. Brent said the alleged nuisance had had its inception in the jurisdiction of the Commonwealth of Virginia, as the ark had been stocked here by a resident of this city, and that several witnesses had testified that they had procured liquor in the ark on Sundays. He read to show that by the terms of the compact between Maryland and Virginia each state had concurrent jurisdiction in dealing with offenses committed by people of their own states.

The court took the ground that the state had a right to take action in such a case and that the law was quoted by the Commonwealth's Attorney empowered the Police Court to sit in judgment upon the case; also that the state could act in the case of nuisances maintained by people of the commonwealth under such conditions as had been presented to the court. A fine of \$50 was thereupon imposed upon Arrington and in addition he entered into bond in the sum of \$100 for his good behavior during the next twelve months, his personal recognizance having been taken in the same. Arrington announced through his counsel that he would appeal the case to the Corporation Court and entered into bond in the sum of \$100 for his appearance before that tribunal, Leroy Beach, Jr., becoming his surety.

### Officers Garvey and Miller Arrest a Fruit Dealer and Recover Five

A Washingtonian came to this city this morning in search of a bicycle which he claimed had been stolen from him, and later located the missing wheel in a repair shop on King street. He notified the police department and Officer Garvey proceeded to the repair shop with a young man named Thomas Rich, who had brought it to the shop for repair and who claimed to be the owner. The latter stated that he purchased the bicycle from William Moore, at resident of West End.

When Officer Garvey proceeded to take charge of the wheel one of the proprietors of the shop attempted to stop him by alleging that fifteen cents was owing upon it for some minor repair. The officer, after assuring him that the claim would be settled, took the bicycle to the station house. Officer Garvey then proceeded to West End in search of Moore, who Rich alleges sold the wheel to him.

Officer Garvey, after some time, found Moore, who is a boy, when it was learned from the boy that he had sold the wheel to Rich for \$3, but that he was acting as agent for a fruit dealer named Fiermonte, who conducts a store on upper King street.

Later Officers Garvey and Miller proceeded to Fiermonte's store, where they found four bicycles. They took charge of the wheels and arrested Fiermonte. One wheel alleged to have been in Fiermonte's possession is missing, but the officers later found it.

### LOCAL BREVITIES.

There was a much-needed rain last night. Officer Roberts killed a muzzless, ownerless and non-licensed dog on St. Asaph street, near Pendleton, this morning. The dog had been annoying the neighborhood for some time.

John Gaskins, a well known colored man who for many years has been employed by the Washington Utilities Company, died at his home, 314 north Payne street, this morning.

### POLICE COURT.

The following cases were disposed of this morning: A man charged with allowing a vicious dog to run at large, was dismissed upon assuring the court that the animal would be sent out of the city.

A white boy, charged with assault, was dismissed. Maud Hall and Blanch Robinson, both colored, charged with disorderly conduct, forfeited their collateral by failing to appear.

William Montague, colored, charged with disorderly conduct, was dismissed.

After the wedding of Mrs. Rose E. Green to Mr. Charles S. Stoler, which took place at Immanuel Lutheran Church yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock, Mr. and Mrs. Stoler left for a trip by water and will be at home after October 1st at 726 King street.
