OFFERS REWARD.

State Will Pay \$100. Each For James J. Alvis and Robert Allen.

Richmond, Oct. 20.—Governor Mann offered yesterday rewards of \$100 each for the capture of James J. Alvis and Robert Allen, escaped prisoners from Orange county.

The Board of Supervisors of the county has offered a reward of \$50 in each case, which reward the governor supplemented by a State reward of \$100 for the capture of each man.

(Alvis, it will be remembered, was arrested in Washington several months ago for stealing a cow at Four Mile Run, in Alexandria county.)

MURDERERS SENTENCED.

Men Who Killed Junk Dealer Found Guilty in Second Degree.

Lynchburg, Va., Oct. 20.—At Amherst Courthouse Saturday John Bear and Bascom Williams were convicted of the murder of David Cooper, of Baltimore, junk dealer, in Amherst county last July.

The shooting took place in a fight which followed Cooper's failure to drive out of the way of an automobile in which the convicted men were riding. Cooper's dying statement was that he was held by one of the defendants and shot by the other. The prisoners asserted the shooting was done in a scuffle.

WOMAN'S HEAD SHOT OFF.

Brutal Murder of a Negress Near Cape Charles, Va.

Cape Charles, Va., Oct. 20.—A little three-room house situated on Old Plantation Creek on Hollywood Farm, one mile from Cape Charles, was the scene of the most brutal murder ever committed in Northampton county, Saturday night, when Abraham Lincoln Ruffin, 22 years old, shot and killed Mary Jenkins, 17 years old, of Norfolk, Va., with a single barrel shot gun.

The woman's head was blown entirely off, and but for the stepfather of Ruffin, Samuel Hooper, her body would have undoubtedly been thrown into Plantation Creek. From the evidence at the coroner's inquest this morning, Ruffin was solely responsible for the crime, although he denied guilt, claiming that the woman committed suicide. He was placed in jail at Eastville, awaiting the hearing before the grand jury. All concerned are colored.

MOTHER KILLED BY HER SON.

Accidental Discharge of Revolver Fatal to Elderly Norfolk Woman.

Norfolk, Va., Oct. 20.—Mrs. Jennie Williams, 66 years old, was accidentally shot and killed at her home, 814 Southampton avenue, Saturday night, by Walter H. Williams, her 19-year-old son. Williams was cleaning a revolver and had taken four of the five cartridges from the weapon and placed them in his mother's lap.

The fifth cartridge was difficult to extract, and the boy was trying to pry it out with a pair of scissors, when it exploded. The bullet entered Mrs. Williams' left temple. She died instantly.

SAVES WOMAN FROM JAIL.

Husband Incarcerated, but Wife Alleged Accessory Sent to Home.

Roanoke, Va., Oct. 20.—After pleading guilty to the theft of \$11,000 from the Pocahontas postoffice, former Assistant Postmaster Edward Silberger was remanded to the Roanoke city jail Saturday by United States Commissioner Goodloe.

Mrs. Silberger, wife of the prisoner, held as an accessory, waived hearing. She has a 6-month-old baby and for that reason was not sent to jail. She will remain at the headquarters of the local Salvation Army, the wife of the captain in charge signing bond to insure Mrs. Silberger's appearance before the United States court at Danville, Va., in November, when her husband's case will go to a Federal grand jury. An effort will be made to secure bail for both of them.

The prisoners were arrested in Cleveland, several days ago, where they fled from Pocahontas.

DESPERADO KILLED.

Jack Perrow First Shoots Policeman in Abdomen.

Lynchburg, Va., Oct. 20.—Jack Perrow, desperado, only a few weeks out of the penitentiary, was shot and killed almost instantly yesterday morning by Policeman George Ware, of the local department. The policeman was wounded perhaps fatally by Perrow before the desperado received his mortal wound.

Perrow was being hunted by Policemen Ware and Hogan, who wanted him for robbing cars in Sandy Hook yard, of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway. The policemen separated and Ware came upon Perrow suddenly in some undergrowth. He shouted to Perrow to throw up his hands, but instead, the desperado whipped out his revolver, and fired five times in rapid succession, the fifth shot striking Ware in the abdomen. Perrow was shot in the left breast, left forearm and in the head.

Perrow was hurried to the Lynchburg Hospital, but died en route. Ware was taken to the Home and Retreat, where his condition was found to be serious.

This is the second time Policeman Ware, who has been on the force about five years, has been shot while discharging his duties. August 19 1911, a negro shot him at 12th and Church street and the wound yesterday is almost in the identical place and practically of the same character, giving the officer but a bare chance to recover.

Perrow had not been out of the penitentiary much more than a month when he was shot, having served a term for wounding Policeman George Hook, when an effort was being made to arrest him for shooting up a yard engine in the Chesapeake and Ohio yard not more than a mile from the scene of the tragedy yesterday.

SEARCHING FOR HEIRS.

Martzes and Phillipps of Virginia. Excited These Days.

Harrisonburg, Va., Oct. 20.—The Martzes and the Phillipps of north Rockingham county are all excited over a little "want" ad published in a local paper asking for information concerning heirs of Frederick Phillips, a native of Rockingham county, who recently died leaving a large estate in Licking county, Ohio.

Family trees, genealogies, Bible records and court documents are being searched in efforts to land information. A lawyer from Ohio, the administrator of the Phillips estate, will arrive here in a few days and it is confidently predicted that he will have but little trouble locating numerous and sundry heirs.

Virginian Injured.

Elvin J. Marcey, thirty-seven years old, of Cherrydale, Va., a motorman on a milk train on the Bluemont division of the Washington and Old Dominion Railway, had his back badly wrenched yesterday as a result of a collision between his car and a passenger train standing on the main line at Leesburg. Marcey was brought to Washington and removed to Georgetown University Hospital. No other person was injured.

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
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
