SOCIAL AND PERSONAL BANQUET AT MT. VERNON ELKS PLAN BIG TIMES

Interesting News Notes About People Members of T. P. A. Entertain National President George H. Armstrong Antlered Herd Get-Together at Last Night's Session -100 Present

 Mrs. William A. Smoot, of this city, is representing the Virginia National Daughters of the American Revolution at the fifth National Conservation Congress, being held in Washington this week.

Fifty members of Post F Travelers Protective Association last night journeyed to Mount Vernon and attended a dinner given in honor of George H. Armstrong, national president of that organization of Merchantville, N. J., who came to Alexandria for the purpose of paying an official visit to the order. Among the invited guests were several State officers, officials of the Chamber of Commerce and representatives of the press.


