BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen of the City of Alexandria, Va., held March 24, 1914, there were present:

F. F. Marbury, Esq., president, and Messrs. Hill, Brill, Ballenger, Osden, Field, Fitzgerald and Summers.

An ordinance to prevent the spilling of illuminating oil and gasoline in the streets of the city of Alexandria was read the second and third times and passed by the following vote: Ayes, Messrs. Hill, Brill, Ballenger, Osden, Field, Fitzgerald and Mr. President—7. Nays, none.

Resolutions appropriating \$2,000 to extend the northwest sewer from Pendleton to Wythe street on Alfred street, appropriating \$1,900 for the construction of a broken stone roadway on Fairfax street from Oronoco to Montgomery street; appropriating \$1,350 for a pipe sewer on Pendleton street from Alfred to Columbus street and half square north and south on Columbus street; appropriating \$1,300 for a pipe sewer on Wythe street from Alfred to Columbus and a half square north and south on Columbus street; appropriating \$700 to improve with cobblestones Oronoco street from Washington to St. Asaph street; appropriating \$700 to improve with cobblestones Oronoco street from St. Asaph to Pitt street, and \$900 for improving Fairfax street from Princess to Oronoco street, were referred to the Committees on Streets and Finance.

A report of the Committee on Streets recommending that the city furnish the Mutual Ice Company with cobblestones, bricks and curbing for improving Cameron street from Union to the wharf of said company was adopted.

A bill for \$2.48 for supplies purchased by the health department was referred to the Committee on Finance and Health.

A report of the Committee on Light and Finance recommending an arc light be placed at the intersection of Princess and Fairfax streets and that the light at Wilkes and Union streets be removed and placed at the intersection of Wolfe and Union streets was received from the Common Council. The Alderman non-concurred in their action and recommended the resolution to the Committees on Light and Finance. The Common Council adhered to their action and asked for a committee on conference. Messrs. Field and Fitzgerald were appointed. The committee reported in favor of allowing the light to remain at Wilkes and Union streets, and that a light be placed at Union and Princess streets. The report was adopted.

The following were received from the Common Council and their action concurred in:

Adverse report of the Committee on Light and Finance on a resolution for placing an arc light at Princess and Fairfax streets.

Resolutions providing for the appointment of a committee of two from each ward to investigate the water supply furnished by the Alexandria Water Company, rents, etc. (Messrs. Osden and Ballenger were appointed on the part of this board.)

Petition of Wm. Demaine & Son, protesting against the placing of a moving picture show next to their undertaking establishment on King street.

Petition of sundry residents protesting against placing a moving picture show on Columbus street, between Duke and Wolfe.

Resolution appropriating \$1,000 for plans and specifications for a new high school building.

Petition of C. R. Clark for permission to erect a garage at the northeast corner of Wilkes and Fairfax streets.

Communication of Harry Kirk, clerk of the School Board, announcing a vacancy in that board caused by the resignation of Dr. W. M. Smith.

The Board then adjourned.

The committee on light reported adversely on a resolution to place an arc light at the corner of Princess and Fairfax street, and the report was adopted. The resolution was returned from the Board of Aldermen non-concurred in, and recommended to the joint committee on light and finance.

And whereas there is much complaint among the patrons of said Water Company as to the quantity and pressure of the water supply and the rates charged therefor;

And whereas the charter of said Alexandria Water Company is believed to be antiquated and not fitted for the proper operation, regulation and control of a public utility under modern conditions;

And whereas the said Alexandria Water Company has itself violated said charter to the injury of the city of Alexandria, by undertaking to lay mains and furnish water to other communities, thereby decreasing the available supply in this city;

And whereas a clearer understanding of the rights of the city and its citizens in respect to the Water Company is deemed necessary;

Therefore Be It Resolved: That a special committee, composed of two members of the Common Council and two members of the Board of Aldermen, be appointed by the presidents of the respective boards, which said committee shall have full power and authority to investigate fully any questions concerning the water supply furnished by the Alexandria Water Company, the quality and adequacy thereof, the condition and size of the mains, pipes and reservoirs, the rates of water rent charged to consumers, and such other matters as said committee shall deem proper. The said committee shall report to Council specifically, the following things:

First: Whether the water supply for extinguishing fires in the city is adequate, and if not, the recommendation of the committee for obtaining a sufficient supply.

Second: Whether or not the rates charged by the Alexandria Water Co. to consumers is excessive in comparison with the rates charged in other cities.

Third: The advisability of applying to the General Assembly to amend the act incorporating the Alexandria Water Company in accordance with the suggestion contained in the opinion of the Supreme Court of Appeals in the case of Alexandria Water Company vs. Wheat.

Fourth: The advisability of applying to the State Corporation Commission to readjust and lower the prices charged by the said Company to its consumers, and to compel the said Company to install larger mains where needed and to provide an adequate supply of water for all purposes, with a sufficient pressure.

The said committee shall have the power to compel the attendance of witnesses, to administer oaths for this purpose of conducting the investigation herein provided for, to confer with the officials of the Alexandria Water Company, and to hold such hearings as may be deemed necessary, which said hearings and conferences shall be open to the public.

That sum of fifty (\$50.00) dollars so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated for the purpose of paying any expenses which may be incurred by said committee in hearings as may become necessary, to make their report.

A communication from the Clerk of the City School Board notifying Council of a vacancy on the Board from the Third Ward, was received; and the election was laid over until the next meeting.

A petition from Charles R. Clark to erect a garage at the corner of Fairfax and Wilkes streets was referred to the committee on streets.

A resolution by Mr. Bryan appropriating \$1,000 to secure plans, specifications and supervising of a building for a new high school, was referred to the joint committee on schools and public property.

A petition from property owners on Columbus street between Duke and Wolfe protesting the erection of a colored moving picture theatre on said block, was referred to the committee on general laws.

A petition from Wm. Demaine & Son calling attention to a proposed moving picture building to be located at 815 King street, and requesting that a permit be not issued until the matter is thoroughly investigated.

An ordinance to prevent the spilling of illuminating oil or gasoline on the streets, was received from the Board of Aldermen, read three times, and passed.

A report of the committee on fire, on the inadequate supply of water, which was received from the Board of Aldermen at the last meeting and laid on the table, was called from the table, and the action of the Board of Aldermen concurred in, and the matter referred to the special committee investigating the Alexandria Water Company.

A report of the committee on streets regarding the use of sufficient cobble and brick for gutters, and old curb for improvement to roadway and wharf property at the foot of Cameron street, was received from the Board of Aldermen and their action concurred in.

The following was received from the Board of Aldermen and their action concurred in:

A resolution appropriating \$700 for roadways and gutters on Oronoco streets, Washington to St. Asaph St.

Also a resolution for \$750 to cobble stone Oronoco street, from St. Asaph to Pitt street.

Also a resolution for \$900 to cobble stone Fairfax street, from Princess to Oronoco street.

Also a resolution for \$1,350 for a pipe sewer, Wythe street, Alfred to Columbus streets, and half square north and south of Columbus street.
