DEATH OF MRS. FLOOD.

Former Resident of Alexandria Succumbs to Injuries.

Mrs. Kate William Flood, who was one of the victims of the automobile accident late Monday afternoon on the Amherst turnpike, died at the Home and Retreat in Lynchburg shortly before noon Tuesday from her injuries.

A pathetic phase surrounding Mrs. Flood's death was that her daughter, Mrs. R. D. Oglesby, another victim of the accident, was in another ward in the hospital, while her sister, Mrs. J. S. Barnes, was confined to her home in Lynchburg by sickness, the result of a fall some time ago, and her only brother, J. Clifton Williams, was confined to his home on Rivermont avenue by illness.

Mrs. Flood was 54 years old and she was a native of Lynchburg. Her husband, Thomas W. Flood, died more than twenty years ago, leaving her with two small children. She was an active member of Westminster Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. Flood only last Thursday received her reappointment to the internal revenue service for a term of four years. She was originally appointed to the service by Captain P. H. McCaull in 1893, and she had served continuously in the collector's office at Alexandria, and Abingdon, until five or six years ago she was transferred to Lynchburg, to take charge of this office, since when she had been actively in charge of the sale of revenue stamps in this division.

Ethel Lorraine Belmont, has won her separation suit against Raymond Belmont, son of August Belmont, the financier, of New York. Alimony at the rate of \$100 a month was allowed. Young Belmont is now abroad.

Alfred Peters Convicted in the Police Court of Furnishing Liquor to Minors

The case of Alfred Peters, charged with furnishing liquor to boys, came up in the Police Court this morning, having been postponed yesterday. John M. Johnson appeared for the defense.

The evidence was to the effect that on the 24th of April Peters sold some whisky he had in a bottle to the youths on Pitt street, near King; also that he purchased half a pint of blackberry wine for them.

The accused denied the charge, and said he saw a man about his size come out of the alley with the boys.

After all the evidence had been taken, Justice Caton imposed a fine of fifty dollars upon Peters. His counsel noted an appeal to the Corporation Court, and the accused furnished bail for his appearance before that tribunal.

FIRE LAST NIGHT.

Blaze in a Stable on Gibbon Street Brings Out Fire Department.

Considerable excitement was caused in the neighborhood about one o'clock this morning when a fire was discovered in the stable attached to the Alexandria Iron Works. The stable is on the north side of Gibbon street, between Fairfax and Royal. The southern sky was soon illuminated by the blaze, but the quick response of the fire department soon subdued it. The interior of the stable was considerably damaged.

ANOTHER AMPUTATION.

Edward A. Downey, who lost part of his foot by being run over by an electric train in Washington several years ago, was compelled to undergo another operation at the Alexandria Hospital yesterday. The first amputation was made at the Emergency Hospital in Washington.

Dog Saves Life of Master.

Geneva, May 7.—Having been entombed in a huge avalanche, Joseph Moser, a young Swiss of Valais, owes his life to the sagacity of his dog. Both had been overwhelmed in the big slide, but the dog managed to get free and made his way to Moser's home, where its peculiar behavior led his father to summon neighbors and set out in search of the young man. Piloted by the dog, the party reached the avalanche and after six hours succeeded in extricating the youth who was unconscious and barely alive.

Elected Head of N. J. Diocese.

Trenton, N. J., May 7.—Rectors and laity of the New Jersey diocese, in convention here, voted unanimously to elect the Rt. Rev. Charles H. Brent bishop of the diocese. Dr. Brent, since 1901 has been Protestant Episcopal bishop in the Philippines. The call has been cabled to him.

Bishop Brent was born in Canada in 1862, and is unmarried. He has filled pulpits in New York and Boston.

Charles Becker, former police lieutenant and head of the famous "strong arm" squad, began yesterday his second battle to save himself from death in the electric chair at Sing Sing prison as the instigator of the plot to murder Herman Rosenthal, the gambler.

Michel Oreste, former President of Hayti, who fled during a revolution last January, has arrived in New York en route to Paris.

Ambassador Myron T. Herrick, in Paris, has written his son that, under no conditions, will he be a candidate for United States Senator from Ohio.

There was a called meeting of the Board of Aldermen at twelve o'clock today for the purpose of facilitating the erection of the new fire engine and truck house on lots Nos. 313, 315 and 317 Prince street, the site now occupied by the Relief truck house and the three wooden buildings in the east.

Mr. Summers introduced a resolution providing for an appropriation of \$12,000 for the work, and it was referred to the finance committee.

The committee will doubtless make a favorable report upon the resolution at the regular meeting of Council next Tuesday night, when the Aldermen will pass it. It will then go to the Common Council where it will be over, under the law, for three days.
