BAPTISTS TO CONVENE.

Southern Convention Opens May 13 in Nashville.

The fifty-ninth annual session of the Southern Baptist Convention will be held from Wednesday to the following Monday in Nashville, Tenn., and delegates representing 23,982 churches with a total membership of 2,446,296 people will be present.

One of the events of interest will be the dedication of the new building of the Sunday school board in Nashville. It cost \$150,000 and is headquarters for all Sunday School work of the Southern Baptist Churches.

A new president will also be elected this year, as the Rev. Dr. E. C. Daryan, of Georgia, has held that office for three years. The Women's Missionary Union will also hold its convention in Nashville next week.

STRUCK BY AUTOMOBILE.

VERA CRUZ PAPER.

John R. Edeien, one of whose nephews is attached to an American man-of-war now at Vera Cruz, has received from the latter a copy of the Mexican Herald, published in that city. It is printed in English and in its nineteenth year. The paper contains but four pages. While papers of much greater bulk are disposed of in this country at one cent a piece, the Mexican Herald brings ten cents in Mexican money, or five cents in gold. The high cost of living does not seem to be confined to the United States. Shoes are advertised in Vera Cruz at from \$15 and \$25 per pair.

A number of Alexandria nobles of the Mystic Shrine will leave here this afternoon for Atlanta where they will attend the meeting of the Imperial Council. E. E.
