



NEWS OF THE DAY.

That Theodore Roosevelt is opposed to the exemption of labor unions from the operations of the Sherman law was the statement made by Representative J. Hampton Moore (Republican, of Pennsylvania, in the House last night.

The Kentucky statute making it legal for farmers to pool their tobacco was yesterday annulled as unconstitutional by the Supreme Court.

Silent and cool, Pietro Rebacci, a member of the so-called "Westchester murder syndicate," was put to death in the electric chair at Sing Sing yesterday for the murder of Antonio Marro at White Plains, N. Y., a year ago.

A little leather case containing 100 milligrams of radium crystals, valued at \$12,000, was lost yesterday in the centre of Philadelphia.

The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad has placed guards on its bridges throughout Belmont county, Ohio, to prevent their destruction by the Industrial Workers of the World. The authorities say they have unearthed a plot to dynamite the bridge crossing the Ohio river at Bellaire.

Twenty persons were injured, one seriously; eight houses destroyed by fire, and six others blown up by dynamite as the result of lightning setting fire to tank No. 31, of the Southwest Penn pipe lines, containing 25,000 barrels of oil, at Meadswands, near Washington, Pa.

Young Jack Fanciculli, stepson of Jerome Fanciculli, an automobile salesman of Washington, D. C., has been located by detectives in Chicago.

After buying a cigar in a store in New York, James Cullivan, 33, remembers nothing, he says, until aroused by two railroad men, who found him in a patch of woods near the Cornell bathhouse yesterday afternoon. Cullivan's clothing consisted of only a pair of tattered trousers. He said, when he went into the cigar store in New York, he wore a

good suit of clothes, and had nearly \$10 in his pockets.

The so-called lumber dealers' trust received a final quietus in the Supreme Court yesterday, when the court held that it was a conspiracy in restraint of trade, and its monopolistic practices must not be continued. The decision was against an organization of lumber dealers in all the eastern cities of the United States, which, according to the allegations of the government, sought to restrain trade by a blacklisting system.

Mayor George Neil, of Dillonvale, Ohio, has called on Sheriff W. A. Husgroff for deputies to guard his court today, when Joseph Ettor, Industrial Workers of the World leader, is to be given a hearing on charges of inciting to riot and assault on Clyde Morrow, superintendent of the Jug Run Coal Mine.

A windstorm which reached the velocity of 57 miles an hour, the highest in the 27 years since the local Weather Bureau has been established, swept over Parkersburg, W. Va., yesterday afternoon, doing great damage to property, but no lives were lost.

While humanity sweltered in a temperature of about 100 degrees yesterday afternoon, snow fell in Murfreesboro, Ind., for more than a half hour, being mingled with a heavy rain. The flakes melted before they reached the ground, but the atmosphere about the higher stories of office buildings much of the time was white with snow.

The Tennessee supreme court's decision that former slaves cannot inherit property under the ordinary rules of kinship was upheld yesterday by the Supreme Court of the United States. The question arose over the case of John Jones, a former slave, who owned a farm in Tennessee which deny the right of colored people to inherit property. The latter was claimed to be in violation of the fourteenth amendment of the Constitution.

BICYCLIST FATALLY HURT.

Struck by One Automobile, While Avoiding Another.

York, Pa., June 22.—Struck by an automobile driven by H. R. Dodson while he was trying to avoid another car, Frank Petrof, of Hellam, was fatally injured last night while riding a bicycle on the Wrightsville pike. Petrof's legs and arms were broken and he sustained a severe scalp wound and internal injuries.

It is alleged that the automobile drivers were racing when the accident occurred.

SHOOTS WIFE; KILLS SELF.

Virginia Farmer Was Angered, Because Woman Left Him.

Bluefield, W. Va., June 23.—Charles Stump, a farmer of Honaker, Va., near this place, shot and severely wounded his wife and then committed suicide Sunday.

Stump had been married only a short time, owing to domestic troubles they had parted, his wife going to her parents' home. He had been trying recently to effect a reconciliation, but was unsuccessful. He met her and three other women Sunday near his home, and implored her to return to him. She again refused and after the other women had gone he shot her three times, kicked her as she lay bleeding on the ground and departed.

Mrs. Stump dragged herself three miles to the nearest house. Her condition is regarded as critical. Stump walked several miles after the shooting to the barn of a friend, where he fired a bullet into his brain.

Verdict in Will Case Set Aside.

Staunton, Va., June 23.—Judge R. S. Galt, of the Corporation Court, set aside yesterday the verdict in the Bradley will case and ordered a new trial. In the trial, Mary Bradley succeeded in having the will of her husband, M. N. Bradley, set aside on grounds of insanity. The father disinherited him and left his estate to a nephew, the Rev. Joseph Bradley, of Tappahannock.
