HELD FOR GRAND JURY

Case of Charles Wright, Charged With Assault, Before Police Court This Morning.

Most of the time of the Police Court this morning was consumed in the investigation of the case of Charles Wright, aged 64 years, who is charged with improper conduct toward two little girls—Marian Dudley, aged eight years, and Grace Gardner, aged six years. The accused was represented by Robinson Moncre, and besides the children several other witnesses were placed upon the stand.

Dr. S. B. Moore testified to the condition of the children, although his evidence was to the effect that neither of the children was seriously injured, but they were not in their normal condition. The doctor was unable to say that their troubles were from natural or unnatural causes.

The complainants told their stories in childish language, telling the day and hour of the alleged offenses. It was, however, stated by George Sutton, engineer at the Mutual Ice Plant where Wright is employed as fireman, that he was on duty at the time of the alleged offenses.

Wright took the stand and denied the allegation.

While according to the law, a conviction cannot follow upon the unsupported testimony of the complainant alone in such cases, certain evidence, regarded as material by Justice Caton, was sufficient to cause him to hold Wright for the action of the grand jury.

MADE FOOTBALL OF HAM.

Bag of Sawdust on King Street Causes Some Merriment Yesterday.

A bag similar to those in which sugar-cured hams are generally enclosed, but which had been filled with sawdust for the purpose of having it used as an advertisement for a fancy brand, was placed on King street, between Washington and Columbus yesterday afternoon by a grocer who is a practical joker. It had not remained long in the thoroughfare before a wagon proceeded up the street. The driver supposing a ham had dropped from a passing vehicle, made a quick descent. The weight of the bundle showed that he had been sold, and he quietly replaced the ham in its original position. Several other persons in passing made a descent upon the supposed prize until a man, exasperated upon finding himself the object of ridicule by numbers who were watching the bag, made a football of the bundle. It was soon kicked to pieces.

DIES OF TYPHOID FEVER

Miss Madeline Martin, Attractive Young Girl is the Sixth Victim in Present Epidemic.

Typhoid fever, which is raging in Alexandria, claimed another death this morning, bringing the number of fatalities up to six since the commencement of the summer. The latest death from the fever is that of Miss Madeline L. Martin, daughter of Captain W. L. Martin, which occurred at the residence of her father at 609 North Columbia street at an early hour this morning. Miss Martin was 19 years old and an unusually bright and attractive young woman. She was a member of the 1914 graduating class of the Alexandria High School and was prominent in the High School Literary Society and other school activities. She was taken ill with typhoid four weeks ago and from the commencement of her illness her condition has been regarded as serious.

Although one new case of fever was reported today the progress of the epidemic is believed by the health officers to be nearing its end. Nearly all of the cases are reported as improving.
