

NEW ORLEANS AS TERMINAL.

Fairfax Harrison and His Party Make Plans for South American Trade

New Orleans, La., Dec. 4.—Coinciding with the visit here of President Fairfax Harrison, of the Southern Railroad, accompanied by E. H. Coapman, foreign freight agent at Washington; C. L. Chandler, South American freight agent; T. C. Powell, third vice president, of Cincinnati, and other officials of the road, came the announcement from the New Orleans Association of Commerce that the Southern was planning to reopen its Chalmette terminals and make New Orleans one of its principal ports for exports business in the United States.

Members of the local body stated that for some time agents of the Southern have been seeking shipments from Southern merchants via their line to South and Central America, and the coming of the big party of Southern officials lends stress to the announcement, since it is said that their inspection of the local terminals will be complete and thorough. Advance information states that Harrison will make formal announcement of the plan when he arrives Thursday.

BURIED TREASURE IN BOX.

Fern Root Diggers Unearth \$17,000 in Mexican and Spanish Coins

Danville, Pa., Dec. 4.—Frank Lewis and Isaac Gearhart, of Danville, while digging for fern roots on an island three miles below the borough, unearthed a rust covered iron box. Gearhart called Isaac Rooke, who was ploughing nearby, and they hammered the box open. They found in it \$16,000 in Mexican silver, \$500 in gold Spanish doubloons and \$1,000 in smaller coins of ancient mintage.

MOB LYNCHES THIRD NEGRO.

Released for Confession, Victim's Friends Wreak Vengeance.

Shreveport, La., Dec. 4.—Kane McKnight, charged with participation in the murder of Charles M. Hicks, postmaster and merchant at Sylvester station, was lynched early yesterday, making the third negro to be hanged by a mob for the crime.

Tobe Lewis and Monroe Dirden were lynched Wednesday, after they had confessed they were in the party of negroes who killed Hicks. McKnight was released by the posse after he had made a confession involving the other negroes, but the infuriated friends of the murdered man made him also the victim of summary punishment.

Merchandise from the Hicks store was found in the homes of several negroes in the neighborhood and other lynchings are likely to result, said reports received today.

WOMAN RESTORED TO LIFE.

Had Been Dead Ten Minutes While Operation was Being Performed

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 4.—After having practically been dead for 10 minutes, Mrs. Walter W. Akers, wife of the California manager for the International Fruit Products Company, and formerly prominent in Poston Society was restored to life following an operation and today physicians say she will ultimately recover.

"The 'raising' was not from a theoretical death, or state of coma as it is ordinarily understood," said Dr. P. M. Williams, who with Dr. C. S. Hutchinson were the principals in the restoration. "Mrs. Akers was actually dead," continued Dr. Williams. "Her heart had stopped its functioning; there was no pulse; the eyes were fixed in the glare which spells to every medical man the eternal sleep; there was no response to the usual tests. The patient was dead. "The end came during the progress of a major operation for laparotomy."

AUSTRALIAN TROOPS TO EGYPT

London, Dec. 4.—"Australian and New Zealand contingents have been disembarked in Egypt," according to an announcement of the official bureau. "to assist in the defense of that country and complete their training there. "When this training is completed they will go direct to the front to fight with the other British troops in Europe."

SALE OF PROPERTY FOR NON-PAYMENT OF TAXES

Resolved, That the Collector of Taxes be and is hereby directed to proceed and sell at public auction all real estate in the City of Alexandria on which taxes are due and unpaid to June 1, 1914 in conformity to the City Charter and Laws relating to the same and sale to commence Monday, December 7, 1914 at 10 o'clock, A. M., and continue from time to time and from day to day until all such real estate is sold.
