**ANNEXED TERRITORY**

City Council at Meeting Tonight Will  
 Consider Measures for New  
 District.

City Council will hold its regular  
 semi-monthly meeting tonight when  
 a number of matters connected with  
 improvements in the new territory  
 will be acted upon. Chief of these  
 will be consideration of an appropria-  
 tion of \$50,000 which is to be used  
 to improve four of the principal  
 thoroughfares running through the  
 new territory. The ordinance impos-  
 ing licenses for the fiscal year com-  
 mencing June 1st, and the annual  
 appropriation bill, both of which have  
 been passed by the lower board will  
 come up for consideration in the  
 Board of Aldermen.

**AIR FLIGHT IS DELAYED**

Richardson Hydro-aeroplane Will Not  
 Attempt to Fly Until Next  
 Week.

No attempt to actually fly the  
 Richardson hydro-aeroplane will be  
 tried this week although experimen-  
 tal runs will be made up and down  
 the river and the surface of the wa-  
 ter may be left for a few feet in  
 jumps which the big machine will  
 make when it is driven at full force  
 by its powerful engines. A. S. Rich-  
 ardson said today that the operation  
 of his machine, presenting so many  
 novel features in air-ship construc-  
 tion, required a considerable number  
 of experiments before a sustained  
 flight was attempted. The action of  
 the lifting planes, the sustaining  
 planes and the rudders all had to be  
 carefully studied out as there was no  
 available data upon which to work.  
 A second trial was made of the  
 craft yesterday afternoon, and it  
 performed more smoothly than in  
 the morning's run. The engines  
 worked more evenly and the plane  
 skimmed along the surface of the wa-  
 ter at a speed of thirty miles an  
 hour. During the afternoon the key  
 pin which holds the rear propeller  
 to the shaft was sheared off, and it  
 was necessary to tow the ship into  
 its berth in order that a new pin  
 could be fitted.

The machine will be taken out  
 again late this afternoon for another  
 trial. In yesterday's preliminary  
 test the machine and its six opera-  
 tors weighed approximately 3,000  
 pounds.

 street adjoining "chicken alley" oc-
