

OFFICIAL BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen of the City of Alexandria, Va., held June 22, 1915, there were present: Henry K. Field, esq., President, and Messrs. Hill, Robinson, Ballenger, Wilkins, and Summers.

The appropriation bill for the fiscal year ending May 31, 1915, received from the Common Council May 8, 1915, and laid over, was read the third time and passed by the following vote: Ayes, Messrs. Hill, Robinson, Ballenger, Wilkins, Summers and Mr. President—7. Noes, none.

An ordinance for imposing and collecting licenses within the city of Alexandria for the year commencing June 1, 1915, received from the Common Council, June 8, 1915, was read the third time and passed by the following vote: Ayes, Messrs. Hill, Robinson, Ballenger, Wilkins, Summers and Mr. President—7. Noes, none.

Mr. Brill introduced an ordinance to prohibit the maintaining of any privy, either box or well, upon any property in the city of Alexandria, when said property binds upon any street or alley in which a public sewer has been or shall hereafter be constructed, the ordinance to be in force one year from the date of its adoption.

On motion of Mr. Ballenger the ordinance was reconsidered and referred to the Committees on Streets and General Laws.

Mr. Brill submitted reports of the Committee on Light, the Clerk of Gas, Superintendent of Gas and the City Treasurer in account with the city gas works, which were received.

A petition of Mrs. Ida M. Hill for an extension of the south Washington street sewer was referred to the Committee on Streets.

The following were received from the Common Council and their action concurred in: Proposal of the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company in answer to an advertisement inviting bids for franchise.

Opinion of John M. Johnson, esq., as to right of the city to collect taxes in recently-annexed territory.

Resolution directing the Commissioner of the Revenue to assess property in recently-annexed territory for taxation.

Auditor's annual statement for fiscal year ending May 31, 1915.

Treasurer's annual statement for same period.

Report of the Finance Committee for same period.

Petition of the Parent-Teachers' Association for an appropriation of \$100.

Report of the Committee on Streets on a petition of Miss Mary Williamson for permission to erect a garage at 715 Princess street.

Report of the Committee on Streets on a petition of the Alexandria Lighting Company for permission to install pipe from sump to river at foot of Wolfe street.

Resolution appropriating \$61.50 to paint the outside of the Columbia engine house.

Resolution authorizing the rental of the old Relief truck house.

Petition of the Postal Telegraph Cable Company for permission to erect a section line from Union Station.

Communication from the Alexandria Water Company in answer to a resolution of the City Council.

Petition of property-owners at George Washington Park for water service.

Resolution providing for a stone crossing at Columbus and Franklin streets.

COMMON COUNCIL.

At a regular meeting of the Common Council of the city of Alexandria, Va., held June 22, 1915 there were present: Howard W. Smith, esq., President, and Messrs. Marbury, H. R. Burke, C. S. T. Burke, Brumback, Wattles, Bales, Brockett, Harrison, Pohl, Lawler and Bendheim.

In compliance with an ordinance passed by the City Council of Alexandria, and in answer to the advertisement, the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company of Virginia submitted a proposal for the right to construct, maintain and operate a general telephone system in the city, with necessary poles, wires, conduits, etc., with a deposit check of \$300, which was referred to the joint Committees on Finance, Streets and General Laws.

Under a resolution passed by the City Council June 10, 1915, the Finance Committee submitted an opinion of John M. Johnson, esq., on the right of the city to collect taxes in the recently annexed territory for the ensuing year, which was read and re-committed to the joint Committees on Finance and General Laws with instructions to take such legal steps as may be necessary.

A resolution by Mr. Smith directing the Commissioner of the Revenue to assess for taxation all land, tangible and personal property, licenses and other objects of taxation situated in the recently annexed territory, was referred to the joint Committees on Finance and General Laws.

The Auditor's annual statement for the fiscal year 1914-1915 was received.

The Treasurer's annual statement of the receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ending May 31, 1915, was received.

A report of the Finance Committee showing receipts and expenditures of the general fund for the fiscal year ending May 31, 1915 was received.

A petition from the Parent-Teachers' Association requesting an appropriation of \$100 for the free playground was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Streets permission was granted Miss Mary Williamson to erect a garage in the rear of 715 Princess street.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Streets permission was granted the Alexandria County Lighting Company to install a pipe overflow from the sump to the river at the foot of Wolfe street.

A resolution by Mr. Taylor Burke appropriating \$61.50 to paint the outside of the Columbia engine house was passed—ayes, 12; noes, none.

A resolution instructing the Committee on Public Property to rent the old Relief truck house for the sum of not less than \$10 a month was passed on the recommendation of the Committee on Public Property.

A report of the Committee on Public Property recommending that galvanized iron toilets be erected in the market court was laid on the table.

A petition of the Postal Telegraph Cable Company to construct a short section line above Union Station with permission to remove poles and wires within the corporate limits was referred to the Committees on Streets and General Laws.

A letter from the Alexandria Water Company in answer to a resolution passed at the last regular meeting of the City Council was referred to the Committee on Streets with instructions to confer with the Water Company.

A petition from property-owners requesting water service to their homes in George Washington Park was received and referred to the Committee on Streets.

A communication by Mr. Lawler for a stone crossing at the intersection of Columbus and Franklin streets was referred to the Committee on Streets.
