LIPSCOMB TO FIGHT ON OLD DOMINION ELECTS SOCIAL AND PERSONAL

Threatens to Take Back Taxes Question To Courts For Settlement

Despite the announcement of the state board of tax review that they had recommended that examiners of records and commissioners of revenue to devote their time securing the correct returns of taxes for 1915 and ignore omitted taxes for past years, and the action of the local board of tax review in agreeing to abide by the recommendation of the state board, W. N. Lipscomb, of Manassas, examiner of records for this judicial district, will carry his fight to secure payment of back taxes to the courts.

Announcement to this effect is made in a letter just received by Robinson Moncure, chairman of the local board of review, from Mr. Lipscomb. In this letter the latter states that he hopes that the local board will reconsider its position in reference to the omitted taxes and that if they do not he will take legal steps for the removal of the board or will institute mandamus proceedings to compel the board to act. Mr. Lipscomb says that he will submit to the local board his complete report which will show the omitted property and incomes subject to taxation.

Chairman Moncure has replied to Mr. Lipscomb stating that the board will adhere to its former action in the matter and advising him that he may proceed as he deems best.

GETS FIVE YEARS IN PEN

Rozier Harrison Convicted of Heinous Crime—Thief Gets Year

Rozier Harrison, a white laborer of Bailey's Cross Roads, was convicted at the special term of the Circuit Court of Alexandria County, Thursday of ruining the life of Ethel Sherry of Arlington. He was proved to have taken advantage of the inexperience of the girl who is under the age of consent and she is soon to become a mother.

Commonwealth's Attorney Mackey, asked Judge Thornton to hold court at this time to try this case lest the girl might not be able to appear in October. He put the facts strongly before the jury. Chas. T. Jesse conducted the defense.

The jury was out for sometime and it is reported one or two were ready to send Harrison to the electric chair, a possible sentence under the Virginia law; but the man was given five years in the penitentiary. It is stated that one juror held out for more than an hour insisting on a light punishment. Wm. Gaines, colored, of Alexandria, entered a plea of guilty on a charge of grand larceny. A jail sentence was asked for him by Harry Thomas, his attorney, but Capt. Mackey insisted on a penitentiary term. Gaines was charged with larceny of a watch pistol and other articles which were stolen some time ago from the home of Mrs. Margaret Bredget at Barcroft.

AUTHORIZE HEATING PLANT

Alexandria County Court House and Jail to Have New Outfit.

Alexandria County Court House and jail are to have a new heating plant at a cost of \$3,000. It is to be put in according to plans and specifications prepared by Frank Upman as architect. A number of bids were considered by the County Supervisors at their regular meeting this week and the contract given to the Standard Engineering Co., Washington for \$2,925, the work to be completed in a month on a forfeit of \$10 a day. The bid of Thos. Hess was \$2,590, but he asked for 40 days to complete the work.

Mr. Upman was also directed to prepare specifications for painting the interior of the court house.
