ST. MARY'S NEW PASTOR CONGESTED SCHOOLS SOCIAL AND PERSONAL

Rev. Louis Smet, of Warrenton, Succeeds Late Rev. H. J. Cutler in Alexandria

The Rev. Louis Smet, at present pastor of the Catholic Church, at Warrenton, Va., has been assigned by the Rev. D. J. O'Connell, bishop of the diocese of Virginia, as pastor of St. Mary's Catholic Church of this city to succeed the Rev. H. J. Cutler, who died several weeks ago.

Rev. Father Smet is a native of Belgium and is a young man. He has been pastor of the Warrenton church for the past three years, succeeding the late Rev. Patrick Donlon, O. S. B. The Rev. L. F. Kelly, assistant pastor of St. Mary's is undecided as to his location for the future, as the question of his assignment is in the hands of Bishop O'Connell.

FINED FIFTY DOLLARS

Young man Convicted for Reckless Running of Auto

Edwin Pain, a young white man was fined \$50 and sent to jail for ten days by Police Justice Caton this morning for the reckless driving of an automobile, this being the first time that a jail sentence has been imposed in the police court for this offense.

Pain was driving his machine in various sections of the city yesterday in a reckless manner and last night collided with a buggy on Shooter's Hill near Walnut street. The buggy, which was driven by a young man and contained a lady passenger, was drawn up on one side of the road for the automobile to pass when it was struck by the machine and practically demolished, both the man and the woman being thrown from the vehicle.

Pain was arrested by officer Gill, who witnessed the accident. A number of witnesses testified that the man had been driving at a fast rate earlier in the day.

After court had adjourned Justice Caton remitted the jail sentence in view of a number of recommendations he received as to Pain's character.

GAMBLERS FORFEITED \$110

Seventeen Arrested in Two Raids Saturday Night Fail to Appear

The city treasury is richer today by \$113.93 as the result of two raids on gambling houses Saturday night. The first raid was made shortly before midnight on a pool room on King street, where eight men were taken into custody, \$2.93 was confiscated by the police.

The second raid was made between 1 and 2 o'clock on a place on the east side of Royal street between Princess and Oronoco streets by Chief Goods, Sergeant Scott and Special Officer Rand. The house was filled with negroes playing poker and they made a stampede when the officers entered.

City School Board Will Meet Tomorrow Night to Consider Question of Accommodations

While the trouble will be temporary, the City School Board is again up against the proposition of how to accommodate the many children who have secured permits to attend the public schools. While this has been a chronic perplexity, especially at the beginning of school sessions, it has assumed a more serious phase since the annexation of surrounding territory. The congestion is generally caused by the increasing number of small boys who appear for tuition. In past years the age limit was seven years; six-years-old youngsters can enter the schools under the present law.

The schools are now overcrowded to such an extent that additional school facilities will be required pending the completion of the new high school building. The school trustees will hold a called meeting tomorrow night to consider securing additional temporary school quarters for the children.

Already in some schools two children are seated at a desk intended for one, and the school floor space is congested, it is reported.

More than 200 children now have temporary quarters in the hall over the Richmond theatre. Even with the additional floor space more room is needed for handling the 2,200 pupils. The lack of space is among the white pupils exclusively, there being an abundance of room at the two schools where the colored children attend.

The school population this term is heavier than in any recent year. It is realized by members of the board that something will have to be done at once to relieve conditions pending the completion of the new high school building, which will hardly be ready before the beginning of next year.

WOULD FIND THE OWNER

L. M. Davis, Ex-Confederate Soldier, Desires to Return Pistol

L. Morgan Davis, one of our oldest and best-known citizens, brought to this office this morning a seven-shooter pistol of small calibre which he took from a young Federal soldier at the first battle of Manassas July 21, 1861. On the handle are the words, "Hubbard Smith from friends."

At the session of the Grand Army of the Republic in Washington there is a possibility of the owner being among those present of the survivors of the union army. If he be alive, he will naturally desire to possess the pistol he used in his first battle. Mr. Davis would be glad to restore the weapon to its original owner.

SUNDAY SCHOOL PARADE
