

INTERNATIONAL COMPANY

Will Finance and Control Money Institutions in all Parts of the World.

New York, Nov. 23.—National City Bank, Kuhn-Loeb, Morgan and Rockefeller interests have formed the American International Company to finance and control enterprises in all parts of the world.

Charles A. Stone, of Stone and Webster, successful managers of upward of a score of traction, electric and other public utility companies, has been chosen to manage the mammoth new banking venture.

Frank A. Vanderlip, president of the National City Bank, is the originator of the project.

Its scope is wider than that of any foreign investment organization in the world. The nearest approach to the American International Corporation is the Deutsche Bank, of Berlin, which finances man industrial ventures.

The soci-bankrupt of Europe has brought a collapse in the securities of even high grade dividend-paying properties in South America and elsewhere. Hence the American financial combination will be able to secure control of many foreign corporations on bargain terms.

Latin American will be the first field to be cultivated. But Russia, the Orient and other quarters of the globe will be tapped in due course. Canadian enterprises may also be brought in.

Prominently identified with Mr. Vanderlip in the American International Company, is Otto H. Kahn, of Kuhn, Loeb and Co. Mr. Kahn is a director of the new company and will be also, it is understood, a member of the finance committee, upon whose shoulders will fall the principal work of developing the enterprise.

Mr. Kahn has had practical banking experience abroad and is recognized as among the ablest railroad financiers in this country.

Charles H. Sabin, president of the Guaranty Trust Company, the largest in the country is to be director. Alfred H. Wiggins, president of the Chase National Bank, is another of the stalwarts interested.

4,033,123 IN M. E. CHURCH.

Losing Members in New England; Making Big Gains in West.

New York, Nov. 23.—The membership of the Methodist church in the North now numbers 4,033,123, according to official statistics. The net increase in membership last year was 164,000.

The report shows that Methodism is losing membership slowly in New England, holding its own in the New York district, and growing most rapidly in Philadelphia, Chicago, Omaha and Minneapolis.

The Methodist church now has 4,497,000 Sunday school children, a gain last year of 313,800, the largest increase in its history. There are 30,000 Methodist ministers.

Methodist property in America is worth \$327,341,000, and the annual expenses of the church are \$40,000,000.

Samuel Gompers was re-elected president of the American Federation of Labor at the concluding session of the annual convention, in San Francisco, Saturday. All the officers of the federation were re-elected unanimously.

COUPLE TO BE ARRESTED

Warrants to be Issued Today for Pair Who Kept Daughter A Prisoner for Years

Easton, Md., Nov. 23.—After conferring with Judges Adkins and Hopper of the Circuit Court for Talbot County; with Miss Emma L. Davies, local agents of the Children's Aid Society of Maryland, and with others who have been pushing the investigation into the strange case of Grace Marshall, held prisoner for years in her home two miles from St. Michaels, State's Attorney Charles J. Butler said last night that he would issue warrants today for the arrest of Miss Marshall's father and stepmother, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Marshall.

The warrants will charge Marshall and his wife with assault with intent to murder Grace Marshall, with imprisoning her against her will and possibly with kidnapping her.

The crime of assault with intent to murder carries a penalty of from two to 12 years in the penitentiary, or at the discretion of the court, in the Maryland House of Correction.

Public sentiment here is so strong against the Marshalls for their inexplicable treatment of race that many persons are making open threats that unless the local officials act speedily the citizens will take justice into their own hands.

WARNS AWAY UNEMPLOYED

State Commission Threatens Them With Rock Pile.

San Francisco, Nov. 22.—The unemployed were warned yesterday by the State Commission of Immigration and Housing of California, to stay away from that state.

"If you are looking for work or charity you will not find the former in California and you will find the latter only through hard labor on the roads or rockpiles," said an official statement.

Forty-four of the largest cities in the state have agreed not to "pass on" the destitute unemployed to other communities, according to George I. Bell, executive officer of the commission.

PRILEP IS BURNING

Geneva, Switzerland, Nov. 23.—Prilep is burning, dispatches from the Balkans report today.

The town is the important southern Serbian center captured by the Bulgars last week on their march to Monastir. It is supposed the Bulgars set it on fire in reprisal for some act by the Serbs.

London, Nov. 23.—Ten thousand Bulgars have been killed and wounded in fighting for Monastir.

The Bulgars forces attacked the town on Saturday, Saloniki advises say. It was learned here today for the first time that the assault was repulsed. Repeated earlier reports were to the effect that town had fallen.

The Serbs, driven southward from Baluhna pass and Prilep, rallied before Monastir and fought desperately. The struggle was at close quarters. The Serbs were heavily outnumbered, but their reckless courage turned the tide of battle in their favor.
