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WANTED TO BLOW UP CHURCH

Former Ironworker's Officer So Testifies of McNamara.

Los Angeles, Cal. Nov. 24.—Patrick J. Dugan, a former officer of the Indianapolis union of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, testified yesterday in the murder trial of Mathew A. Schmidt that John J. McNamara, head of the dynamiting conspiracy in which Schmidt is alleged to have had a part, had threatened in 1906 the destruction of a cathedral then in course of construction in Indianapolis.

Dugan said that he, McNamara, who was secretary-treasurer of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, and Eugene Clancy, a labor leader of San Francisco, now serving a Federal sentence, went to look at the cathedral and McNamara said:

"When they place nonunion men on this job you write me a letter saying you need some of it. I will know what you mean and I will send some one here to blow this place to h—."

Dugan said he objected at one time to the custom of the international union of reimbursing local unions for expenses incurred in dynamiting and McNamara told him to shut up.
