#### Plans For Selection of Delegates Considered By City Democratic Committee

Alexandria Democrats who are anxious to represent their party at the State Democratic convention which will be held in Roanoke on June 2d, will not only have to pay their expenses out of their own pockets, but will be required to deposit \$5 for the privilege of entering a Democratic primary, which may be held for the purpose of selecting the delegates. The latter part of the proposition is uncertain, as the city is entitled to ten representatives and ten alternates and it is not expected that there will be such a rush for the honors as will make it necessary to hold the primary.

Plans for the selection of the delegates were considered last night at a meeting of the city Democratic committee held in the office of Howard W. Smith, Charles Bendheim, chairman, presided and the following members were present: Theodore Cook, Samuel G. Brent, Oscar Phillips, Howard W. Smith, Capt. Albert Bryan and S. P. Fisher.

On motion of Samuel G. Brent, the committee unanimously endorsed the administration of President Woodrow Wilson, his foreign policies and pledged its support to him.

#### BOARD OF ALDERMEN

#### Action of Common Council on Ordinances Regarding Annexation Bonds Concurred In

A called meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held at noon to day to consider two ordinances, passed by the Common Council last Tuesday night and laid over under the law by the Aldermen. One was setting part a sum equal to twelve per centum of the value of lands in portions of Alexandria and Fairfax counties recently annexed by this city, and the other providing for the issuance of \$70,000 registered and non-registered bonds and to provide for a sinking fund.

The ordinances were read the first time and passed by unanimous votes, after which the board adjourned.

#### ZEPELIN IS SHOT DOWN

#### British Anti-Air Guns Destroy Sky Raider and Crew Surrenders

London, April 1—One of the five Zeppelins that participated in last night's raid on England was shot down by British anti-guns, and fell off the Thames Estuary, forty-five miles east of London, early today.

The Zeppelin's crew surrendered when British patrol boats approached, and were made prisoners. The Zeppelin broke up immediately and sank.

The dirigible brought down is believed to have been the one reported over London last night, shortly before the theaters began to discharge their crowds.
