HONORS TO MR. MACKAY

Former Commonwealth's Attorney of County is Presented With Gold Watch

Capt. Crandal Mackey, who retired as commonwealth's attorney for Alexandria county at the beginning of this year, was presented with a handsome watch in appreciation of his public services at a mass meeting at the county courthouse last night.

Judge J. B. Thornton, of the circuit court, presented the watch, on behalf of residents of the county.

The meeting was held in honor of Captain Mackey and Frank L. Ball, the present commonwealth's attorney. Each spoke briefly on conditions in the county and its prospects for the future.

County Clerk George H. Rucker presided, and made a brief address. Charles T. Jesse read a letter from Dr. Joseph Taber Johnson, of Cherrysdale, commenting on changes in conditions in the county that occurred during Capt. Mackey's incumbency.

SHOE FAMINE THREATENED.

No Ships to Bring Foreign Leather. Prices May Soar.

Pittsburgh, April 17.—Declaring that the United States is threatened with a serious shoe famine because there are no ships for the importation of thousands of tons of leather available in foreign countries, the Pittsburgh Shoe Retailers' Association has inaugurated a nationwide movement urging on Congress the establishment of a merchant marine.

It was predicted that unless the leather situation is relieved, tan shoes will retail for \$10 next year, and the prices of other shoes will be increased proportionately. The local association proposes that the government build 50 ships a year for five years.

BABY OUTDOES HIGH DIVERS.

Falls Four Stories, Smashing Clotheslines, and Escapes Unhurt.

New York, April 18.—Two year old Samuel Wandouff fell four stories to the yard of his home Sunday afternoon breaking several clotheslines on his way and landing on the turf, as lightly as a circus acrobat. His mother, who saw him tumble from the window as she was cooking dinner, fainted. Upon being revived she found the baby sucking his thumb and heard Dr. Nelson, of Gouverneur Hospital, remark that he couldn't find anything the matter with Samuel but a few scratches, and those were several days old.

FOOD TOO HIGH IN SPAIN.

Country Suffers More Than Any Other Neutral by War Prices

Washington, D. C., April 18.—Prices in some parts of Spain, according to consular advices reaching here have been forced so high by the war that many foods ordinarily used by the working classes have been put entirely beyond their reach. The mere prospect, it is declared, are paying 85 per cent more for table articles than formerly. In no other neutral country, it is asserted, has the cost of living risen so sharply.

In southern Spain, the closing down of some industries is said to have added difficulties. Food prices in the South are declared to average 99 per cent. higher than prices in the United States. Since August, 1911, bread in Seville has risen 25 per cent butter, 142 per cent; eggs, 85 per cent; flour, 89 per cent., and meat, 40 to 60 per cent. Imported canned goods are quoted at almost prohibitive prices.

Rents are up 15 to 20 per cent.; coal costs 150 per cent. more than usual, and the cost of gas, electricity and medical supplies has doubled.

TOLLS INCREASED

At a recent meeting of the Fairfax board of supervisors an increase was authorized on horse drawn vehicles traveling the Fairfax—Washington macadam road from four cents to five cent per gate. There will soon be three gates in operation on this road, two now being in operation. The third is being erected near Chain Bridge on the Fairfax county line.
