

VIRGINIA NEWS

J. Travers Colston, 27 years old, committed suicide yesterday near Swimley, Clarke County, by shooting himself in the right temple with a revolver. The body was found an hour later by his father, Randolph C. Colston, a prominent farmer.

Delegates from many sections of Virginia arrived last night in Richmond for the annual convention of the State Council, Daughters of America, which held its initial session this morning in Murphy's Hotel. Mrs. Floda Reagen, president of the State Council, reached the city in time last night to attend the reception given by the three local councils—Capital City, No. 7; Dove, No. 12; and Pride of Richmond, No. 14—in honor of the visiting delegates and members of the order, National Councilor Webb, of the Junior Order United American Mechanics, delivered the principal address.

That the Rev. George W. McDaniel, D. D., pastor of First Baptist Church in Richmond who Sunday started his congregation by tendering his resignation at the morning service, does not contemplate taking up another regular pastorate, but is preparing to launch an active religious campaign along lines of his own, is the belief of his friends. It is believed that Pastor McDaniel has for sometime been working out a new and probably entirely unique religious forward movement, of which he himself will be the prime organizer. It is suggested that Dr. McDaniel may begin a series of meetings in various parts of the country after the order of the "Billy" Sunday meetings.

Orange was visited yesterday by a band of gypsies traveling in three automobiles. After pitching their tents just outside the corporation limits, they proceeded to do the town. While telling the fortune of George Knighton, an automobile mechanic, one of the women is alleged to have taken \$15 which he had in his vest pocket. Missing the money shortly after her departure, he overtook her and compelled her to return it. The same woman is alleged to have entered the store of John R. Grimes, while the proprietor was counting his cash before depositing it in the bank, and to have departed with \$31. Grimes missing the money had her arrested. She denied the theft until she was put in jail, whereupon she returned it. Not wishing to keep her in jail at an expense to the county, she was released, and the gypsy band was escorted across the county line by the sheriff.

MOB LYNCHES POSTMASTER.

Masked Crowds Takes Vengeance for Killing of Naval Stores Operator.

ChIPLEY, Fla., April 18.—County authorities were working yesterday to discover who was responsible for the lynching Sunday at Vernon, of John Dykes, postmaster of Green Head, Washington county. Dykes had been arrested charged with killing S. A. Walker, a naval night operator, and was taken Sunday night from the Vernon jail by a mob of masked men, who overpowered the deputy in charge.

TREE YIELDS AGED BRANDY

Can elieved at Least Seventy Years Old Found in Roots

Woodland, Del., April 18.—Twelve-year-old peach brandy is highly prized in Delaware, so the joy of Arthur Massey, a Woodland farmer, can be imagined when he discovered a can of peach brandy supposed to be 70 or more years old where it had been buried for many years. Massey was digging up an apple tree on his farm when he found, wrapped in the roots of the tree, a glass can filled with brandy and with a peach in it. The can was wrapped in tin and the roots of the tree had grown around it.

The peach was as firm as the day it was picked and it is said by those who tasted the brandy that it was finer than the morning dew. Massey has both the peach and the can of brandy on exhibition, but he promises no more tastes. The apple tree is known to be at least 70 years old.

BLASTS OF GASOLINE KILLS

Shatters Railroad Handcar and Slays Foreman of Laborers

Salisbury, Md., April 18.—T. W. Robinson, track foreman at Exmore, Va., was killed and four laborers injured, one of them seriously, when the gasoline engine of the handcar with which the gang was going to work exploded yesterday morning at Painter, a few miles north of Exmore. Robinson lost one ear and a large hole was blown in his head. A laborer named Charles Mears was seriously cut and bruised on the head but the other three laborers were only slightly injured.

Robinson and Mears were rushed to this city and taken to the Peninsula General Hospital where Robinson died last night. Mears is not expected to live. The handcar was blown to pieces. Robinson leaves a wife and three children.

PRICE OF GASOLINE.

The Fear of 40 cents by June 1st. Well Founded.

Philadelphia, April 18.—When Representative Howard, of Georgia in the House of Representatives, the other day, declared that present indications pointed to 40 cent gasoline, by June 1, he was expressing no idle fear. His information, according to his own words, came from the Secretary of Commerce and the Secretary of Commerce found it out when he was attempting to renew a gasoline contract between his department and the refiners. They demand 40 cents a gallon, and the Government halted the negotiations until it could find out whether the refiners were joking. Apparently they are not.

ONE DIES IN LOVE TRAGEDY.

Sweetheart is Viciously Wounded and Admirer a Suicide.

Lancaster, Pa., April 18.—John Singley, 28, of Manheim, fatally wounded his sweetheart, Emma Schoenberger, 20, of Lititz, at the young woman's home early last night and then sent a bullet through his own head, dying instantly. Jealousy was ascribed as the motive.

Singley called at the young woman's home, and when she came to the door he said: "I've got a present for you."

When Miss Schoenberger extended her hand for the "package" Singley fired two bullets below her heart. Her condition is critical.
