OFFICIAL LAW IMPOSING TAXES ON PERSONS, REAL ESTATE ETC. An Ordinance for the imposing and collecting of taxes on persons, property, etc., within the City of Alexandria, Va., for the year commencing on the 1st day of June, 1916, and ending on the 31st day of May, 1917, for the support of the city government, the payment of interest on the city debt and for other municipal expenses.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Alexandria, That the tax on persons, real estate, tangible and personal property and stockholders of Banks within the City of Alexandria, for the year commencing June 1, 1916, and ending May 31, 1917, for the support of the city government, payment of interest of the city debt, and for other municipal expenses, shall be as follows:

FIRST—On every male inhabitant of the City, over the age of twenty-one years, there shall be levied and collected a capitation tax of 50 cents.

SECOND—On all real estate and tangible personal property owned or held by citizens of the city, or located within the city, subject to taxation for city purposes under the Constitution and laws of this State, there shall be levied and collected the sum of One Dollar and Eighty cents on every One Hundred Dollars of the assessed value, and the further sum of twenty-five cents on every One Hundred Dollars of the assessed value, provided, that the levies and assessments as given in this section shall not apply to banks and banking associations in the city subject to State and City taxes, the taxes thereon being hereinafter provided for, as made in section three of this ordinance in conformity to the State laws regulating the same. The revenue from the One Dollar and Eighty cents of said levy shall be collected, paid over and accounted for by the Collector of Taxes. On all bills paid in full to the Collector of Taxes on or before July 1, 1916, there shall be allowed a discount of five per centum, and on all bills paid on or before September 1, 1916, there shall be allowed a discount of three per centum. All bills not paid in full on or before December 1, 1916, shall be returned delinquent and there shall be paid and collected upon the unpaid portion of said bills a penalty of five per centum; and upon all bills remaining unpaid on June 1, 1917, damages at the rate of six per centum per annum, shall be paid and collected. The revenue from the additional twenty-five cents of said levy shall be paid to the City Treasurer, and on all bills remaining unpaid on December 1, 1916, there shall be paid and collected upon the unpaid portion of such bills, a penalty of five per centum; and all bills remaining unpaid on June 1, 1917, shall be returned delinquent, and interest at the rate of six per centum per annum shall be paid and collected. The assessments of rent charges and ground rents, in fee simple shall be valued at sixteen times their annual amount.

THIRD—On each stockholder of banks and banking associations in the City and liable to State taxes, there shall be levied upon the actual value of the shares of stock owned by him a tax of One Dollar and fifty cents on every One Hundred Dollars value thereof; provided, however, that the Commissioner of Revenue shall deduct from the value of such shares of stock of such bank for the purpose of local taxation only the value of any bonds of this City held by such bank; and each of said Banks and Banking associations shall pay to the City Tax Collector the said tax assessed to its stockholders.

Richmond yesterday morning told a reporter that despite urgent appeals from both his own church members and hundreds of other people in the city and State, he had definitely determined to let his resignation from the pastorate of the church stand.

William Henry Talbot, 11 years old, only son of Policeman James Talbot of Norfolk was killed Tuesday night when he fell from a pole on the corner of Fourth and Madison streets. He was in company with other boys, and had climbed the pole which supported an electric light. The Talbot boy mounted about 20 feet up the pole, to a cross arm, supporting an electric light. He suddenly emitted a yell, as if he had received an electric shock, and plunged backward to the sidewalk striking on his head.

Sheriff Webb Sydnor and County Officer Shumaker last night arrested W. B. Palmer, who lives on the Osborne Turnpike about four miles out of Richmond, as a result of a fire which completely destroyed his residence. The fire is said by Palmer to have started when he turned over a lamp accidentally, but the farmer is alleged to have threatened his wife and children several times, and they fled from the house early last night.
