DEATH OF DR. GIBSON SOCIAL AND PERSONAL POLICE BOARD MEETS

Well-Known Alexandria Physician Succumbs to Second Stroke of Paralysis

Dr. Thomas S. Gibson, one of Alexandria's ablest and best known physicians, died this morning at 2:05 o'clock, following an attack of paralysis several days ago. Shortly before his death Dr. Gibson lost consciousness and passed away in that state.

Dr. Gibson was a son of the late Dr. William Gibson, and was born fifty-six years ago at Morris Ill. His parents removed to this city when he was but one year old. He graduated in medicine from the Maryland University, of Baltimore, in 1887, and since that time up to his death yesterday has practiced his profession in this city.

Surviving him are his mother, Mrs. Margaret Gibson, of this city, four brothers and four sisters, Alexander and Richard Gibson, of this city, Frank S. Gibson, of Elizabeth, West Va., William F. Gibson, of Bridger, Mont., Mrs. David J. Howell, and Miss Emily Gibson, of this city, Mrs. John T. Cole, of Washington, and Mrs. J. E. Mushbach, of Red Lodge, Mont.

The deceased was pleasant and gentle in his demeanor and was very popular among all who knew him. His funeral will take place Friday morning at 11 o'clock from his late residence, 601 Duke Street, and the services will be conducted by the Rev. William J. Morton, rector of Christ Episcopal Church.

Officer Roberts Elected Second Sergeant—Officer Nicholson is Dismissed.

A shake-up in the police force of the city was the result of an adjourned meeting of the board of Police Commissioners held last night at 7:30 o'clock. First Sergeant Bettis was reduced to the rank of private owing to advanced age, and Second Sergeant William J. Wilkerson was appointed his successor by the board. Private John T. Roberts was chosen to take the place of the second sergeant. These changes become effective May 1. The board dismissed Policeman A. J. Nicholson for violating rules of the force.

The meeting was presided over by Commissioner George H. Schwarzmann, in the absence of Mayor Fisher and the other members present were Commissioners Knight, Shinn, and Sweeney.

The board will meet again next Monday night to elect a successor to A. J. Nicholson.

BOYCOTT OF RAILWAY.

Discharged Employees Start Campaign to Arouse Public Sentiment Against Company

The locked-out and striking employees of the Washington and Virginia Railway, have posted the following placard in Washington and Virginia stores and on the streets:


