

TURKS FEAST TEUTONS

Ottoman Foreign Minister Blames Russia for War.

Berlin, May 2—The following account of the banquet given in Constantinople Sunday night by members of the Committee of Union and Progress in the Turkish Parliament for a party of Deputies from the German Reichstag has been issued:

"The Turkish Minister of Foreign Affairs, Halil Bey, delivered an address of welcome. He stated that the war originated with Russia, which desired to conquer the Dardanelles. Russia was encouraged by Great Britain and thus dared to fight for possession of the straits for a free entrance to the Mediterranean.

"In the Duma, M. Sazanoff, the Foreign Minister, announced that the historic moment for Russia had come to enable her to obtain free access to the seas. Russia's political leaders and newspapers, Halil Bey continued, seconded this declaration and asserted that possession of the straits was a political necessity to Russia.

"The British Prime Minister gave assurance that Russia's desire ought to be accepted.

"Halil Bey continued: "This unanimous declaration discloses that the plan was sanctioned by treaty between these nations. England formerly had led the European nations against France but now she joined her forces with France and others in order to eliminate her young powerful German rival.

"The alliance with Japan was for England's protection against Russian expansion in Asia. This enabled England to make concessions to Russia at Turkey's expense.

"When the war began England and France suggested that Turkey come to an understanding by which the integrity of Turkish territory knew that the aim of the Russians was the conquest of the Dardanelles; that France was waiting for Turkey's downfall and that a treaty with the Ententes meant nothing but oppression by tutelage.

"Germany suggested an alliance on the basis of equal rights for both countries and mutual assistance in case of danger. The Sultan and the Turkish nation accepted the German proposition and escaped the tutelage of foreigners.

"Germany kept her word and drafted a convention with Turkey giving to Turkey's consular offices in Germany the same rights as those given to Germany in Turkey, and regulating the questions of jurisdiction over residence in both countries on the basis of equality.

"Halil Bey announced that these negotiations had virtually been concluded and that the treaties would be ratified in the near future. He insisted that the treaties were founded on mutual respect of rights and sovereignty.

"Count Wolf-Metternich, the German Ambassador, replying to the Turkish Foreign Minister, said that both countries were desirous of a peace which guaranteed the existence and future of the nation. Germany's desire, he said, was to see Turkey strong, standing on her own legs and maintaining not only now, but also in the future, the valuable and faithful alliance.

"Germany, therefore, the Ambassador said, asked for no domains in which her interests were to be considered as paramount, nor did she want any position which conflicted with the dignity and independence of Turkey."

YOUNG WOMAN KILLED

Murdered in Automobile by an Admirer

Lexington, Ky., May 2—Miss Lula Blanton was shot and instantly killed near Fleming Sunday night when the automobile in which she and three friends were riding was halted. James Thompson, an electrician of Middlesboro, who came to the coal fields several months ago, is in jail at Whitesburg, waiting an examining trial.

Shortly before the shooting Miss Blanton and Thompson were together at a hotel in Neon. Thompson has been very attentive to Miss Blanton since he came to the coal fields. Thompson left the hotel first Sunday night and soon after he had gone Miss Blanton and three other friends started for an automobile ride, going toward Fleming. The machine was halted on the way, occupants said, and a man walked within a few paces of the car, took aim with a pistol, and fired.

The bullet from a .32-caliber automatic pistol hit Miss Blanton's neck, ranged upward, and lodged in the cap she was wearing where it was found later. Death resulted instantly. Miss May Cook, a friend of the dead girl, who was in the automobile became hysterical when her companion was killed, pitched forward out of the car and narrowly escaped serious injury.

COOL WEATHER TO RETURN

Weather Bureau Also Warns of Rain Near at Hand.

Washington, May 2—Winter like weather has returned along the northern border, with freezing temperatures from Northwest Minnesota westward almost to the Pacific Coast. The Weather Bureau has issued the following forecast:

"Unseasonably cool weather, with frosts, will prevail during the coming week in the region of the Great Lakes the upper Mississippi Valley and Ohio Valley and the Rocky Mountain and Western Plateau regions. In the Atlantic and Gulf States moderate temperatures the first half of the week will be followed by cool weather after Wednesday.

"Generally fair weather will prevail during the next several days, except that local showers in the Mississippi Valley and the district east thereof will attend the eastward movement of a disturbance of moderate intensity that is now over the Plains States. It will probably reach the Atlantic Coast Tuesday or Wednesday. Another disturbance will reach the Pacific Coast about Wednesday or Thursday and move slowly eastward, probably reaching the Middle West at the close of the week. This disturbance will be attended by general rains."


