

PAY POLL TAXES TODAY SOCIAL AND PERSONAL SHAD ARE PLENTIFUL

Those Who Fail to Do So Cannot Vote at Presidential Election In November

The time for the paying of poll taxes in order to be qualified to vote in the presidential election of November 7th. will expire tomorrow as the state law requires the payment of poll taxes six months in advance of the day of election. There has been a steady flow of voters to the office of Thomas W. Robinson, city treasurer, for the past ten days and during today and tomorrow it is expected that even a greater number will avail themselves of the opportunity of paying their taxes. In case it is necessary Treasurer Robinson will keep his office open tomorrow night for the accommodation of late comers.

Up to today 1860 persons had paid their poll taxes, an increase of 70 since the holding of the Democratic primary for mayor in April. This is the largest number of persons who have qualified to vote in Alexandria in several years and is due to the interest in the coming presidential election.

In addition to voting for the presidential electors the voters will be called to vote for the first time in the history of Virginia directly for a United States senator, this being the first senatorial election since the passage of the constitutional amendment providing for a direct vote for senators. There will be only one name on the ticket as no opposition has developed against Claude S. Swanson, who will be a candidate for re-election.

The congressional election for a representative for the eighth district of Virginia will also be held. Representative Charles C. Carlin, will be opposed by Joseph L. Crupper who has been nominated by the Republicans.

HARD SHELL CRABS NOW ON SALE AT RAMMELS CAFE

Secretary Redfield Says Run Has Been Good and Fish in Good Condition

Secretary Redfield of the Department of Commerce has made the following statement concerning the Potomac fishery this year.

"The fact has been brought to the attention of the Bureau of Fisheries that statements are being made respecting the alleged scarcity and poor quality of the Potomac river shad, which are entirely false and which seem to have for their basis an attempt to maintain a high price to the consumer at a time of unusual abundance, when the fishermen themselves are selling at a low figure. The run of shad in the Potomac river is larger than it has been for years and is excellent quality. Among the statements made are some to the effect that the Potomac river shad are not in good condition because of the spawning season, and also the statement that the Potomac river run of shad is nearly over. Neither of these statements is true. The Potomac river shad are in excellent condition; they are unusually numerous; and the time when the shad are best eaten is when they are in spawning condition, that is when the fish comes into the rivers and can be caught. The run of shad is unusually late; the season has just begun and will continue throughout the month of May, possibly longer. So far as their food value is concerned the shad from the Potomac are fully equal to any from other streams and are doubtless better because they are received in fresher condition."

COL. MOSBY SERIOUSLY ILL.

Confederate Chieftain Suffering From Infirmities of Advanced Age.

Col. John S. Mosby, is dangerously ill at Garfield Hospital in Washington and his friends are very much alarmed and fear he will not recover. His condition is due to advanced age, he being now 82.

Col. Mosby went to the hospital Tuesday night. Physicians, while holding out little hope, said he seemed slightly stronger yesterday.




