GERMANY AND AMERICA

Von Bethmann-Hollweg's Warning Against a Rupture With United States

London, May 12—What purports to be a summary of the speech of Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the German Imperial Chancellor, at the secret sitting of the General Committee of the Reichstag, on May 5, concerning Germany's reply to America is published by the Wireless Press, under a Berne date. The wireless press states that the following remarks by the Chancellor may be accepted as unquestionably authentic:

"I have said before that we must drop all sentimentality. I repeat that. With regard to our dispute with America, our self-respect was wounded by the aggressive wording of the American note to Germany. Our feelings urge us to repel this interference with out legitimate methods of warfare, and tell America to mind her own business, but considerations of policy compel us to subordinate patriotic zeal to patriotic reason. We must be guided, however, not by our feelings, but by the coolest judgment.

"We have one aim and one duty namely, to win the war; therefore, and policy which endangers our victory must be avoided. The overwhelming majority of expert opinion regards a rupture of relations with America as a grave peril."

"It is folly to under-estimate the consequence of a conflict with America, nor should we risk only America's enmity. Our information leads us to believe that other neutrals might follow America's lead.

The imperial government has weighed every factor and is convinced of the necessity of avoiding a breach with America.

"These are the hard facts of the present situation. We have worded a reply such as may reserve future liberty of action. If the situation changes we may cancel concessions to America and resume unrestricted submarine operations, but for the present we must overcome our feeling and pursue the policy most conducive to final victory over all our enemies."

BRYAN TO BACK WILSON

Senator Kern Declares Former Secretary Will Labor For the President's Re-Election

Washington, May 12—Senator John W. Kern, majority leader of the Senate, said yesterday:

"William Jennings Bryan is for the renomination of President Wilson and he will do all in his power to bring about his re-election.

"Those who are charging that Mr. Bryan will oppose the nomination of Mr. Wilson, or that after he is nominated Mr. Bryan will not support him do not know the man. I believe I know him well and know his views on matters generally with regard to the Democratic party, and I know that Mr. Wilson will have a loyal and valiant supporter in the former Secretary of State.

"There seems to have been a concerted effort to put Mr. Bryan in an attitude of antagonism to Mr. Wilson and one way of doing this has been to charge him with being the prime mover in every organization that is supposed to be opposed to the policies of this administration or that may embarrass the President. This is unfair to Mr. Bryan. There will be no discord in the party. Mr. Bryan will be found supporting the President as loyally and as ably as any Democrat in the country."


