

HONOR MOTHERS' DAY

Special Music in Churches Tomorrow and Ministers Will Deliver Appropriate Discourses.

Elaborate programs have been arranged for the observance of Mother's Day tomorrow. In all of the churches of the city special musical program have been prepared and there will be sermon which will have the love of mothers as their subjects. Several visiting clergymen will occupy local pulpits.

APPLES WITH BOILED RICE.

4 apples, 2 tablespoons of powdered sugar, 1/2 cupful of water. Juice of 1/2 lemon, 1 heaping tablespoonful of butter.

Peel, core and quarter apples. Place in earthen baking dish in single layer. Sprinkle with powdered sugar and lemon juice. Add water and the butter divided into small pieces. Bake in steam oven, hours. Use frequently with tender. Serve with boiled rice, using the juice in place of cream.
