

BRANDEIS TAKES OATH

Wife, Daughter And Brother Attend Public Swearing in of New Justice

Washington, June 6.—Louis D. Brandeis, of Boston yesterday took his seat as an associate justice of the Supreme Court, the sixty-second citizen to rise to that high distinction.

The ceremonies lifting the new justice from among the rank of attorneys to a seat on the first court of the nation were precisely those by which his predecessors of the last generation were likewise elevated.

At noon when the court marched on to the bench, the new justice, close behind, took a seat beside the clerk of the court. When Mr. Brandeis' commission had been read the clerk administered the judicial oath, taken by judges to do equal justice to rich and poor.

Mr. Brandeis' nomination was confirmed by the Senate June 1, after one of the bitterest fights ever waged against a Presidential appointment.

Mr. Brandeis' wife and daughter, a brother, Alfred Brandeis, of Louisville, Ky., Secretary of War Baker and Attorney General Gregory occupied reserved seats in the courtroom which was crowded.

59 KILLED BY TORNADO

Northern Part of Arkansas Suffers Severely, but Storm Is Very General

Little Rock, Ark., June 6.—Fifty-nine persons are reported to have been killed and more than 100 injured in a tornado which swept through Central and Northern Arkansas late yesterday.

North Arkansas appears to have suffered most severely, although the storm was general throughout the State.

At Judsonia, one-third of the town was said to have been swept away. The tornado swept clean an area four blocks wide and twelve blocks long.

Memphis, Tenn., June 6.—A dispatch to the Iron Mountain Railroad office here from Bald Knob, Ark., reported several persons killed and considerable property damage in White County by the tornado which swept through Central Arkansas late yesterday.

Hot Springs, Ark., June 6.—Four persons were killed and several were more or less seriously injured in a tornado which swept across Garland County and cut a path through the southwestern portion of Hot Springs late yesterday.

The electric light and power plant is incapacitated, and the city is entirely without traffic service or lights. A church also was blown down and many frame buildings destroyed.

SAILOR EATEN BY SHARK.

Richmond, June 6.—Victor Matheson, an insane seaman, who jumped overboard from the Norwegian steamship Venator while outward bound from Boston to Cuba to load cargo for this port, was devoured by sharks before assistance sent from the ship reached him.

According to those on the Venator, which reached port yesterday, Matheson was shipped on the vessel at Boston and was making his first trip. Nothing strange was noticed, about the man until May 26, when the ship was approaching Barbados, Cuba, it was late in the afternoon when Matheson was seen by other members of the crew to leap over the side of the ship headfirst into the water. He never uttered an outcry and for a few seconds was seen floating on the surface.

Captain Anderson immediately stopped the vessel and a lifeboat was lowered and rushed to the place where the man was last seen. While making a fruitless search in the vicinity several huge sharks were seen.
