

RUSSIAN OFFENSIVE.

Capture 25,000 Men, 27 Cannons and 50 Machine Guns.

Petrograd, June 7.—The Russians continue to develop the successes won by their newly inaugurated offensive. It is reported that up to the present time they have captured 480 officers, 25,000 men, 27 cannon, and more than 50 machine guns.

The sudden blow struck by the Russians along the entire Galician front of 275 miles from the Pripet to Roumania is, in the unanimous opinion of the military critics here, a brilliant beginning of the long awaited Russian offensive. The condition of the roads now is perfect and with a plentiful supply of ammunition the Russian advance is expected to develop swiftly.

The movement derives significance from the fact that it is not an isolated attack against any one portion of the Austrian lines, but a carefully coordinated movement embracing the whole front. The movement is under the able leadership of Gen. Brusiloff, who conducted the brilliant campaign in the Carpathians in 1914 and who is generally conceded to be one of the best strategists of the Russian staff.

The forces opposing the Russian advance are estimated at 40 Austrian infantry divisions and from 10 to 15 Austrian cavalry divisions, assisted by, at the most, two divisions of Germans. This brings the total Teutonic forces operating on this front up to 600,000 men.

Aside from its military and strategic importance for this front, the Russian movement undoubtedly will have a powerful effect upon the military situation elsewhere, decreasing Austrian pressure on the Italian front from the necessity of bringing reinforcement to this theater, while it also is expected to influence the situation in the Balkans.

Amsterdam, June 7.—Dispatches from Vienna report that a violent battle has been raging during the last 24 hours on the Russian front along a sweep of 300 kilometers (about 200 miles.) The correspondents describe countless waves of Russian infantry being sent into the battle.

Gen. Brusiloff, who is believed to be in command of the Russian forces on this front, seems, according to the advices, to be following tactics pursued by the Russians in the Carpathians, making attacks in mass, in an effort to break through the hostile lines.

A telegram from Wise County, announces the death of R. D. Morrison agent for a life insurance company who was caught under an automobile when it turned turtle. Mr. Morrison was forty years old and a native of Rockbridge County, being a son of the late Dr. Robert Morrison, of near Lexington.

J. T. Hall and H. Bradshaw, machinists, employed at the plant of the United Cigarette Machine Company at Lynchburg, while walking on the Southern Railway tracks late yesterday were run down by passenger train 36. Both men were thrown from the track, but escaped serious injury. Hall has a broken rib, and both are bruised.

One night last week, near Lowesville, Amherst county, a white man named Mays was burned to death in his tobacco barn. It is supposed that while Mr. Mays was asleep in the building, some trash became ignited, and when he awoke, the fire had gained too much headway for him to make his escape, the door being locked on the outside. He leaves a wife and several children.

Aviator Steve MacGordon died at 2 o'clock yesterday morning in Newport News hospital as the result of the burning Monday of an aeroplane which he was driving. E. F. Keefer, a student, who was in the machine with MacGordon, was not seriously injured. The engine fell from its bed caused the machine to strike the ground as it was rising, jammed the engine into the gasoline tank, and the machine was totally destroyed by flames.

BRITAIN'S LATEST LOSS

Country Mourning Over Death of Lord Kitchener

London, June 7.—All Britain was stunned last night by grief over the tragic loss of Earl Kitchener, who, with his entire staff, was drowned Monday night when the cruiser Hampshire, on which they were voyaging to Russia, was sunk either by a mine or torpedo.

An army order was issued for all officers to wear mourning in memory of Lord Kitchener for a week commencing today.

That the Hampshire was torpedoed by German design is generally discounted. It is believed in the highest circles that the ship either struck a mine or was torpedoed in a chance encounter with a German submarine.

First official news of England's greatest personal loss since the war began was made public by the admiralty just before noon yesterday in the following official statement received from Admiral Jellicoe:

"The commander in chief of the Grand fleet reports with deep regret that H. M. S. Hampshire, Capt. Herbert J. Savill, R. N., with Lord Kitchener and his staff on board, was sunk Monday night about 8 o'clock,

to the west of the Orkney Islands, either by a mine or a torpedo.

"Four boats were seen by observers on shore to leave the ship. The wind was north-northwest, and a heavy sea was running. Patrol vessels and destroyers at once proceeded to the spot, and a party was sent along the coast to search, but only some bodies and a capsized boat have been found up to the present. As whole shore has been searched from the seaward I greatly fear that there is little hope of there being any survivors.

"No report has yet been received from the search party on shore. H. M. S. Hampshire was on her way to Russia."

Accompanying Earl Kitchener as his staff were Hugh James O'Beirne former counsel of the British Embassy at Petrograd, and former minister at Sofia; Col. O. A. Fitzgerald, private secretary to the war minister; Brig. Gen. Ellershaw, Sir Hay Frederick Donaldson, technical advisor to the minister of munitions; Lieut. McCherson, aide; F. S. Robertson, and Detective McLaughling. Officers

and men who abandoned the Hampshire numbered between 400 and 500. The casualties probably will total 500.
