



SUNDAY CLOSING LAW

Drastic "Blue Statute" Will Cause Shut Down of Many Places of Business.

Alexandria druggists are preparing to observe the Sunday closing law in its fullest extent next Sunday when the enforcement by the police of the drastic "blue laws" will be attempted. At a meeting of the retail druggists of the city yesterday it was decided to only fill prescriptions on Sunday and to keep their stores open only during certain hours of the day. The soda water fountains will be shut down, cigar cases locked and the sale of all articles except necessary drugs dispensed with.

Chief of Police Goods was busy yesterday advising the merchants that the law would be enforced on Sunday and any violations of the act would result in the offender being brought before police court on Monday.

VIRGINIA NEWS

B. F. Ginther, business manager of the Union Star, a Socialist paper, of Brookneal, and himself a Socialist leader, was elected Mayor of Brookneal, yesterday defeating R. P. Conolly. Ginther has the distinction of being the first Socialist ever elected Mayor of a Virginia town.

Confronted by the Virginia oyster law, which becomes effective next Sunday, the authorities of Bristol take the view that they cannot do otherwise than enforce the "blue" law and any and all other laws upon the statute books. "If the 'blue' law is unpopular," said Mayor George M. Warren, in commenting on this subject, "it is up to the legislature to repeal it. The same is true with reference to all laws. We, as officials, have no choice in the matter; we must enforce the laws."

Treasurers of counties and cities in Virginia have the right to seize and sell vessels in the waters of this state, when owned in the state, for taxes due thereon. Such is the ruling made by Assistant Attorney General Garnett. Though the vessels are registered in the federal custom houses, they are not in any way affected, so far as the state is concerned, in securing the revenue on such property. Mr. Garnett says the case in point arose in Mathews county.

George Lam, 24 years old, shot himself through the heart Monday at Lydia, Greene county, half a mile across the Rockingham line. Lam went into his house took the wedding ring from his wife's finger, slipped it on his own finger and then kissed his wife, saying "I am going to settle some trouble." A hundred yards from the house he discharged a double-barrel gun into his heart. Lam's wife was Miss Julia Dean. They were married a year ago and later separated, but it was thought they had adjusted their differences.

Edicts are going forth in Virginia cities for enforcement to the letter of all statutes, including the so-called Sunday Blue laws, in preparation for going into effect at midnight Saturday of the new State oyster act providing for the removal of officials who fail to carry out the laws. On Sunday drug stores will be allowed to sell medicines only, tobacco and soft drink places and automobile garages will be closed, and in some cities the authorities are threatening to prohibit the printing or sale of newspapers.

In an automobile accident yesterday afternoon near Suffolk, Capt. W. H. Collins, of Norfolk, was fatally injured and Cleveland S. Taylor was badly hurt. Capt. Collins lost control of the roadster, in which he was en route to Suffolk, the machine going over an embankment and turning turtle. He died an hour after the accident in a local hospital. Taylor may recover.

ELECT ENTIRE TICKET

Only Seven Hundred and Fifteen Cast in Yesterday's Primary.

Only 715 votes were cast in yesterday's election and the entire Democratic ticket was elected, Thomas Chauncey, republican, in the fourth ward and A. D. Deeton, independent in the second ward, who were candidates for council only receiving a few votes each.

Mayor Fisher was re-elected for a term of four years which will commence on September 1st.

As a result of the election Councilman Harrison, one of the oldest members of the common council, goes to the board of Aldermen, Councilman Howard W. Smith is transferred from the second to the first ward and Councilman H. R. Burke was transferred from the first to the third ward and there will be two new faces in the lower board, George H. Evans from the first ward and Jerome Kaufman from the second ward. Both of these will commence their terms on September 1st, but it is probable that Kaufman will be elected at the next meeting of council to fill the unexpired term of R. D. Trumbuck, deceased.

The vote by wards in yesterday's election follow: First Ward, Fisher 124; for alderman, F. F. Marbury 122; for council, George H. Evans, 119; Howard W. Smith, 108.

Second ward, Fisher 207, for alderman, W. W. Ballenger, 206; for council Henry K. Field, 195, Jerome Kaufman, 168; Andrew D. Deeton, 11.

Third ward Fisher, 117, for alderman, J. T. Harrison, 116, for council A. J. Pohl, 112, H. R. Burke, 116.

Fourth ward, Fisher, 267, for alderman, J. B. Fitzgerald, 258, for council, Albert Bryan, 239, Clinton S. Ballenger, 231; Thomas Chauncey 50.

Jesse W. Morris was elected mayor of the town of Potomac, between Alexandria and Washington, yesterday, over W. E. Kidwell, incumbent, by a vote of 25 to 22. John W. Varney, clerk, was re-elected over W. T. Ferrell, by a vote of 25 to 22. The Rev. O. C. Beall was elected treasurer without opposition, receiving 49 votes.

For town sergeant Adolph E. West defeated J. A. Russell, incumbent, by a vote of 25 to 22. The following were elected to council: George R. McCauley, 38; Fred S. Morris, 25; Norval T. Ford, 24; Ernest R. Fegan, 23; George J. West, 23; Alvin R. Pennypacker, 23.

Defeated candidates and the votes they polled were as follows John R. Harding, 22; H. H. Powell, 22; Jacob Corl, 22; Robert M. Turner, 21; Joseph Lyles 20; W. T. Peverill, 5.

MANY WITNESS PARADE

Alexandrians Form Large Percentage of Floating Population of Washington Today.

Thousands of Alexandrians went to Washington this morning to witness the preparedness parade. Members of R. E. Lee Camp of Confederate Veterans and of the order of Fraternal Americans, of this city, took part in the parade.

In addition to marching down Pennsylvania Avenue in the parade President Wilson commemorated Flag Day by speaking at the inter-departmental exercises of the Government clerks held on the Monument Grounds shortly after the end of the parade. When nearly 25,000 marchers from the departments ended their parade down the Avenue behind the President, many remained for the unique exercises in honor of the flag, which began at 3 o'clock.

A chorus of nearly 1,000 persons sang patriotic anthems, and as the President entered the stand, the Marine Band played "Hail to the Chief." Secretary of State Robert Lansing presided at the exercises. The audience, too, joined in the singing of "America" and "The Star Spangled Banner."

As a national salute was fired by the field artillery of the National Guard, a large American flag was raised slowly to the top of the Washington Monument. During the playing of the national anthem at the end of the exercises, it was slowly lowered.

ALLEGED VIOLATION OF LAW

Saloon Keeper Charged With Keeping His Place of Business Open on Election Night

Among the cases upon the docket of the Police Court this morning was that of the proprietor of the Fleischman Hotel, who is charged with conducting business last night in violation of the law which provides for the closing of such places on election days. The police upon discovering the saloon to be open, and having every reason to believe liquor was being dispensed, made a descent upon the place and cited the proprietor and inmates to appear before the court this morning. When the case was called Frederick P. Russell, counsel for the accused, asked that the case be allowed to go over until next Wednesday, and his request was granted and the case will come up at that time.
