

'PROPHECY, WHY GIVEN'

Evangelist Gibson Delivers Interesting and Instructive Discourse At Gospel Tent Last Night

"Prophecy, Why Given," was the subject of Evangelist Gibson last night at the gospel tent on North Washington street. The attendance was good and all present manifested interest in the theme which had been selected.

Among other things the evangelist said prophecy was likened by the Bible unto a light that shineth in a dark place, and this was spoken by inspiration which revealed future events. That it was given for the benefit of man, so that he might be prepared for definite things which are to take place. "Surely" he said "the Lord God will do nothing except first revealing it through his servants the prophets. For prophecy came not in old time by the will of man, but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost."

The speaker impressed upon the minds of all present the importance of believing all the Bible, for he said, it is the Word of God. Jesus said, "O, fools and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken. Ought not Christ to have suffered these things and to enter into his glory? and beginning at Moses and all the prophets he expounded unto them in all the scriptures the things concerning himself." The Bible reveals Christ from Genesis to Revelation, and the speaker appealed to divers texts of scripture to show that Jesus Christ was in the beginning with the Father, and that all things were created by him.

The subject of the evangelist tonight will be "The Kingdom of this world revealed in a dream in Babylon."

SCOPE OF SUNDAY LAW

Alexandria Merchants Will Observe Act Providing for Closing Business on Sabbath

The members of the police force of Alexandria have practically notified all shopkeepers in this city that the law requires them to cease to transact business on Sunday. Of course, the statute applies only to cases where there is no actual necessity to carry on business on that day, and in no way affects their engaged in occupations which are actual necessities. There seems at present no disposition on the part of any one to contest the validity of the law, and it is believed that, in the main, it will be observed.

Many queries have been propounded to the authorities as to what will be allowed and what will be interdicted next Sunday, and the replies have been made on common-sense lines. In the meantime it may be stated that it is the purpose of the authorities to enforce the law, and in cases which may be brought to the attention of the Police Court where persons have defied the act, those who may be unable to show that their occupations are necessary or have been upon lines of well-doing will be subject to fines. As to the validity of the law, the Police Court, not being an appellate tribunal, will not presume to rule on that issue, and will carry out the law as it appears in the code. Should offenders conclude to enter appeals and test the law they can, of course, do so.

By next Sunday the officers of this commonwealth will be performing their duties under the full realization of the provisions of the oyster law. They will take no risks under the present order of things, and those who may persist in violating the law must expect to be dealt with. We hope none will attempt to pose as defiers of the law.

Mayor Royston Jester of Lynchburg has given out a statement relative to the operation of the "oyster" law, in which he announces that there will be no change in the way the laws have been enforced in the past. He says:

"The much-talked-of Sunday law is nothing more than Section 3788 of the Virginia Code, which was amended slightly by the last General Assembly the enforcement of which is to be secured by means of the new 'oyster' law. Why there has been so much comment upon it throughout the State I do not understand for as the law has been upon the statute books heretofore it should have been enforced just as any other law has been enforced.

"We will see that all laws are enforced in this city, but the amendment to the statute will cause no change in the policy which has been pursued in carrying out the law in Lynchburg heretofore. Different people have different ideas about what constitute household duties, works of necessity and charity, and for that reason I do not see how any one can fix upon any hard and fast rule or line that must govern all the people of a community at all times, for what might constitute a work of necessity or charity today might not tomorrow or at some other time, and that which might be a necessity for one person or family might not be for another. Every case, therefore, should stand upon its own peculiar facts and circumstances."

ACTING BOARD MEETS

The Acting Board of the Potomac Association, which embraces all Baptist Churches in Northern Virginia, convened this morning at the First Baptist Church. The Board is made up of representatives of various churches. The representatives from Alexandria, being Dr. E. B. Jackson and James R. Mansfield. In addition to the Acting Board there were present a large number of ministers of various churches in the Association. Matters pertaining purely to denominational work were considered. Dr. Langsdale of Richmond, representative of the Foreign Mission Board was present and addressed the Body on the subject which he represented. The Board will conclude its session late this afternoon.
