The reading of State reports and a discussion of foreign missions by Rev. Egbert W. Smith, D. D., of Nashville, Tenn., featured yesterday's session of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Presbyterian Church of the United States at Norfolk.

The State Convention of the United Spanish War Veterans, Department of Virginia opened yesterday in Fredericksburg. A camp fire was held at the Courthouse last night.

The Democrats of the Ninth Virginia District are growing anxious to get into the thick of the fight. Chairman Buchanan is expected to call his committee together at an early date when steps will be taken looking to the nomination of a candidate for Congress to oppose the Republicans.

B. F. Ginther, the Socialist elected Mayor of the town of Brookneal in the election on Tuesday, will not take office, for the reason, it is stated, that it has been discovered that he was not a qualified voter at the time of the June election.

Irvin P. Whitehead, of Lynchburg, a member of the Virginia Democratic Committee which went to Washington to present President Wilson with resolutions adopted by the Democratic convention, will return to his home with a bride.

Richard Billings, a colored chauffeur, was murdered by two white men, who hired his car early Wednesday night for a drive into the country near Norfolk.

Tom Hendricks, one of the three Hendricks brothers who were ring-leaders in the wholesale robberies of freight cars in the Sandy Rock yards of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway during a period of nearly six months last year, and who was awaiting sentence to the State Penitentiary for his part in the crimes, escaped from Sheriff R. L. Perrow, of Campbell county, Wednesday night at Amherst.

GERMANY WANTS PEACE.

But insists it must be Upon the Basis of the Present War Map. Berlin, June 17.—Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, the Imperial Chancellor, addressed the Reichstag yesterday afternoon on the question of peace, declaring that Germany's position has never been so strong since the war began.

The chancellor's speech came unexpectedly during the third reading of the budget.

"Six months ago I first spoke of our readiness for peace," said Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, "basing my remarks upon the military situation as it existed then. I could do this confident that the situation created by the war would develop still further to our advantage. Events have justified this confidence. We have made further progress and we are now stronger on all fronts than ever before."

The chancellor declared that Germany would neglect nothing which might shorten the war.

"If I should say we are now ready for peace, despite the strength of our position, there would be no reason to regret the words, although our offer previously made had no success with our enemies," said Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg. "During the critical days in July, 1914, every statesman had the duty before God, before his country, and before his own conscience to preserve an honorable peace. In the same fashion we, after successful defense, will neglect nothing which might shorten the terrible sufferings in the European conflagration."

Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg recalled an interview he had given to American journalists recently in which he declared that peace negotiations could only be undertaken by responsible statesmen of belligerent countries and would have to be conducted on the basis of the "war map."

This statement indicated that Germany would not accept peace overtures coming from a neutral nation.

"This proposition was rejected by our enemies, who refused to recognize the war map," said the chancellor. "They hope to be able to change that map. In the meantime the war map has undergone other changes, but all to our advantage. We have entered into that map the capitulation of the English army at Ket-el-Amar and French defeat at Verdun as well as the failure of the Russian offensive and the powerful advantage of our ally (Austria) against Italy and the increased strength of our lines at Saloniki.

"We must and will continue fighting until decisive victory is won. We thought it our duty to open the road for peace, but we were rebuffed by the enemy with scorn and disdain."
