

DEFEAT OF WHITE SOX

Cardinals Win Game Yesterday Afternoon by a Score of Six to Five

In an interesting and hard fought battle the Cardinals defeated the White Sox yesterday by the score: Cardinals, 6; White Sox, 5.

The Cardinals were greatly handicapped by not having a pitcher in condition for duty, and Tommy O'Donnell, an outfielder, was assigned to duty on the mound and did fairly well until relieved by Jimmy Sweeney, who finished the game, although the latter twirler has been troubled with the "charley horse" for several weeks.

Jimmy Quayle, pitching for the White Sox, performed in big league style and deserved to win but his teammates failed to aid him when they had various opportunities to put runs over the plate.

Next Sunday the Cardinals and the Eagles will meet in their first round for championship honors and a fine game should be the result as both teams will use their best players in an endeavor to win.

By winning yesterday at Clarendon from the Alexandria County Athletic Association nine, which a Sunday before, had defeated the Cardinals in the opener of the series for the amateur baseball championship of northern Virginia, the Alexandria Eagles jumped into first place in the title series and can be tied only by being defeated next Sunday at Baggett's diamond by the Cardinals.

The score of yesterday's game at Clarendon was 7 to 2. The Cardinals defeated the White Sox here yesterday by the close score of 6 to 5, relegating the White Sox to last place in the standing of the series.

The White Sox meet the A. C. A. A. nine next Sunday at the Cove, and unless the White Sox manage to capture this contest, it is unlikely that they will end in or near the front of the race. The teams all appear to be rather evenly matched, however, and no one can yet pick a winner.

In the game at Clarendon yesterday Lefty White, the diminutive twirler of the Eagle nine, held his opponents to six scattered hits, and struck out eleven, and he was supported well by his teammates.

VIRGINIA NEWS

While in a launch in East River in Matthews county last Friday, Philip H. Muir, one of the most prominent citizens of this county, was drowned when he lost his balance and fell overboard.

Advices forwarded by State Auditor Moore to the court clerks of the Commonwealth instruct these officers that under the delinquent capitation tax bill passed by the last General Assembly only poll taxes that are delinquent for the years 1911 and 1912 can be listed for forcible collection under the new law.

News has been received of the death of Carroll Dale, nineteen years old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Dale, formerly of Bristol. Young Dale, with three companions, undertook to overtake a boat in the Kentucky River, that was carrying a dancing party. The race was made in a light launch. Approaching in the wake of the big boat, the launch was sucked under, and the entire party of four drowned.

To bring all the Virginia military organizations now under arms up to full war strength, 2,183 men will be required, according to the schedule received from the Eastern Department. The most serious deficiency in men is in the First and Second Regiments, new on the Mexican border. Each of these organizations is short more than 900 men of having full war strength. The deficiencies among State military bodies are divided up as follows: First Regiment, 947; Second Regiment, 985; First Squadron Cavalry, 121; Battery C, Field Artillery, 83; First Battalion, Field Artillery, 16; First Company, Signal Corps, 3; Field Hospital, 28.

GREAT BRITAIN'S BOYCOTT

President Wilson Considering Armed Neutrality.

It was intimated in administration circles yesterday that President Wilson is considering armed neutrality with which to defeat Great Britain's warfare upon American neutral foreign trade, under the guise of a blacklist of American individuals and firms.

The President was represented as being disturbed by the evidences of British aggression at the expense of the United States and to have indicated to members of the Cabinet his determination to bring Great Britain to account.

The action under consideration, it was said, is twofold:

First, the furnishing of public vessels as a convoy for merchant ships flying the American flag.

Second, the purchase from German owners of several large ships which have been tied up in this country since the war began.

Instead of refusing to sell to Great Britain, it was stated, the United States may furnish an armed convoy which would prevent interference of any kind by English and French warships with the American merchant ships so protected.

The United States has treaties with several countries providing that merchant vessels flying the American flag, engaged in innocent trade and accompanied by a public ship, which would include lighthouse tenders, revenue cutters or warships, shall not be subject to visit and search.

An authority declared yesterday that by sending convoys with American trading vessels to Scandinavia, via, Holland and South America, Great Britain, under no pretext, could hold them up at sea and divert them to Kirkwall, and that the blacklist would be killed.

At least four persons were killed and 44 or more injured Saturday in San Francisco, when a timed bomb, concealed in a sut case, exploded on San Francisco's main thoroughfare, in the midst of a throng viewing a preparedness parade. A one-story brick structure, against which the sut case stood, was wrecked, and the explosion blew a gap through the crowd, blasting men, women and children. It is possible that some bodies were blown out of existence. The sut case contained cartridges bullets, gas pipes, scrap iron and glass. One suspect was arrested.
