FREEDMEN BUREAU ECHO

Death of U. S. Officer Brings to Mind Issues Following War Between the States

Army circles in New York have heard of the death at Hague, Lake George, N. Y., of Brig-Gen J. G. C. Lee, U. S. A. (retired). He was 80 years old. The funeral will be held in Washington next Sunday. Interment will be in Arlington.

During our civil war and for several years subsequent thereto to Gen. Lee was an officer in the quartermaster's department in Alexandria. The depot of supplies at that time was in what was known as the old "Brown Shed," on the river front between Cameron and Queen streets, erected in 1859 when the New York and Virginia Steamship Company began to operate ships between Washington, Georgetown, Alexandria and New York.

These were the days of the Freedmen's Bureau, and the war being over, hundreds of negroes were herded in Alexandria, dependent for subsistence upon the government or the city. Alexandria was willing to take care of the negroes native and to the manner born, but darkies who had been manumitted and who had refused to this city failed to appeal to our people. The state was out of the union at the time, and the military still had charge here, that is to a certain extent. An issue soon arose between Captain Paul R. Hambrick, of the Freedmen's Bureau, and the late Hugh Latham, who had a short time before been elected Mayor. Hambrick, and incidentally, Lee, who was a colonel at the time, took issue with Mayor Latham concerning the alleged lack of attention to the "contrabands," as the freed negroes were called. Long cards from these officials at short intervals filled most of the local department of the Gazette. The embroglio was confined almost entirely to a war of words, the mayor being as firm as Gibraltar in the position he had taken.

Colonel Lee resided in this city some time after the close of the war, but after 1870, when the state had re-entered the union, the great bulk of northern people who were here during the four years' hostilities moved away, and Colonel Lee was sent to new fields.

DEATH OF ELDERLY LADY

Mrs. Lucy F. Garret, widow of the late B. W. Garret, died at 1:30 o'clock this morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Alice Pettit, 222 Jefferson street, after a lingering illness. She was eighty one years of age, and had lived in this city the greater part of her life, being a former resident of Loudoun county. Three daughters, including Mrs. Pettit, and one son survive the deceased. Funeral arrangements have not been made.

SEWER TAPPING ACTIVE

Only Three Days Left For Delinquents to Make Connections and Escape Fines

Three more days remain for residents of this city who have not tapped sewers to comply with the new compulsory sewer tap law, which compels all owners of property bordering on streets having sewers to connect with same before August 1. Many are pouring into offices of City Engineer Emmett C. Dunn, to obtain permits to tap sewers, for which the city charges a fee of \$10 and in addition \$1 for every foot of frontage of property on the sewer.

The great majority of residents have already complied with the regulations of the city in this respect, but there still are a number who have failed to do so and these are making a rush to obtain permits. Those failing to tap sewers before August 1, are subject to fine.

DEATH OF O. W. CHILTON.

Mother of Deceased Was Miss Massie of Alexandria.

Orrick M. Chilton, 50 years old, for 20 years central passenger agent in this city of the Seaboard Air Line Railroad Company, was found dead in his room on the Seventh floor of the Rennett Hotel, Baltimore with a bullet wound in his right temple shortly after 8 o'clock yesterday morning. A pistol was clutched in his right hand. He had evidently committed suicide. Ill health and the fear of having to undergo an operation for an ailment from which he had suffered for some time is attributed as the cause for the act. Born in Warrenton, Va., Mr. Chilton was the son of the late Dr. A. Chilton. His mother before marriage was Miss Catherine Massie, of Alexandria, Va., who is also dead.
